Cautiously Optimistic: Iranian Protests, Democracy, and Women by Dawn Bali



On a Facebook group, <u>My Stealthy Freedom</u>, more than 820,000 followers, like this woman, silently protest Iran's hijab law.

In the past month, tens of thousands of Iranians took to the streets in protest, admonishing their government for failing economic policies and social injustices. The Iranian regime, led by Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei'i, has insisted Iranian citizens abide by resistance economic strategies that unduly affect the middle and lower classes. Unemployment, increased inflation, and subsequent increased cost for basic food stuffs drove people to the streets late this December. [Read the article and see additional photos <u>here</u>.]


The committee will meet at Cynthia's home at 4 pm on Monday, January 29, Monday, February 12, and Monday, March 12.

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Minutes of Zonta Club of Denver Meeting

1-11-2018

Dine-In at Barbara Pellegren's home

The meeting was called to order at Barbara Pellegren's beautiful home by President Julie Bradley at 6:00 pm. Members were invited to eat the potluck dinner.

After dinner, Carol Mangold delivered the Advocacy Moment. She told us about:

- The Colorado Women's Legislative Breakfast on February 27 to be held at the Scottish Rite Masonic Lodge, 1370 Grant St., Denver. Breakfast is \$20, from 7-9 am and the 2018 theme is Disrupting Power Dynamics.
- 2. March 15 is the Women's Foundation of Colorado Lobbying Day. They tell us how to lobby for legislation. WFCO.org = equitable opportunities for women.
- 3. A YouTube video produced by Jackson Katz who is a cultural theorist. The video is called "Violence Against Women: It's a Men's Issue." You can also catch it on Ted Talk.
- 4. On February 5, the theater on E. Colfax will show a film (6:15 8:30) on how to socialize younger boys. Produced by Jennifer Newsome, it is called "The Mask You Live In" and it was in the Sundance Festival in 2015. You can purchase tickets on Event Brite.

There was no Treasurer's Report.

Mary Benoit is recovering from surgery, but her Service team reported that Mary has been in touch with our grant recipients and all are informed about the Grant Awards Dinner on Febr. 8 and about our Film Event on March 31.

Get Well cards were signed for Mary Benoit, Penny Burke, who broke her arm, and Sara Ball who has had a hip replacement.

Membership: Liz Savage reported that the Grant Awards Dinner will be at the Rendezvous Restaurant in Aurora, in the Heather Gardens complex. Cautiously Optimistic: Iranian Protests, Democracy, and Women

In the past month, tens of thousands of Iranians took to the streets in protest, admonishing their government for failing economic policies and social injustices. The Iranian regime, led by Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei'i, has insisted Iranian citizens abide by resistance economic strategies that unduly affect the middle and lower classes. Unemployment, increased inflation, and subsequent increased cost for basic food stuffs drove people to the streets late this December. Iran's President Hassan Rouhani had just released his budget proposal for the next Iranian year (beginning in March) further fueling the enmity of the people. Iranians for the first time saw how much the regime-instigated skirmishes in Syria, Iraq, and Yemen were costing them. The regime for years had bought popular support by subsidizing food and fuels costs, pacifying their generally lower-class supporters. The new budget curtails those pay offs and diverts more money to the widely viewed corrupt Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps and other regime-affiliated organizations.

While the religious Shi'a faction of the government has ultimate control, many aspects of governance resemble democratic practices of the West, including participation of women. Iranian women take an active role by voting, holding office, and even organizing movements to advance their position in society.ⁱ Compared to other neighboring countries, Iranian women have more rights. They can drive, hold office, and become professionals; however, under the guise of religion, patriarchy still stunts their progress. Iranian women are active participants in their society and raising their voices for change.

The most recent economic strains disproportionately affect women and children. It is little wonder that women have come to symbolize both the 2009 Green Movement and those that took place recently. Neda Agha-Soltan was shot and killed during the 2009 protests. Pictures of a woman waiving her white hijab and another Iranian woman raising her fist have gone viral on social media. The woman waving her hijab is missing and likely arrested.

The Human Rights Watch and other sources report the majority of college graduates in Iran are women, yet their participation in the labor force is only 17%.^{II} The government created discriminatory laws and regulations that favor men, with the intent to spur declining birth and marriage rates and likely reduce competition for jobs. More women were graduating with hard science majors than men and then, in 2012, women were forbidden to participate in 77 fields of study, citing lack of "lack of employer demand".^{III}

Gender discrimination is preventing these women from becoming an economic powerhouse, further diminishing Iran's capacity to move toward its 21st century ambitions. The regime's Islamic theocratic ideology is bankrupt, with corruption and patriarchy reigning supreme. Iranian women will play a critical role in improving their country.

How can we help? What can be done?

This is a tricky proposition. Any overt foreign support of dissension is delegitimized by the regime as foreign meddling in their sovereignty. Quieter support in the form of social media "likes" can bolster fragile campaigns, empowering more and more women to get involved. Additionally, we can support policies that take advantage of American soft power. Over 60% of the Iranian students applying to

American universities are women. Aging Iranian mullahs are faced with pacifying a youthful majority that wants increased civil liberties, economic opportunities, and the Western goods and services they see on social media or obtain through the black market.

The Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action in 2015 that traded sanctions relief for Iranian cooperation to suspend their nuclear program has had seemingly unintended consequences. The West hoped the funds would go to rebuilding the Iranian economy; rather, the regime used the new wealth to funnel more weaponized support for the Syrian Assad regime, Yemeni Houthis, and the Iraqi Shi'a government. Of course, in the short term this is a negative, especially as it jeopardizes American military lives. Taking a play out of the Iranian playbook and looking at the long game, the regime has tipped their hand to their base, the poor of Iran.

This is what is momentous about these recent demonstrations. The protests did not originate in the capital, Tehran. The first emerged in Mashhad, the Supreme Leader's hometown and a religious stronghold. The frustration spread throughout the country, igniting numerous smaller cities and motivating the previously loyal poor to speak out. The government clamped down, made arrests, and quelled the citizens with double talk.

Ultimately it has to be up to Iranians to make effective, lasting change. Those that had led previous reform movements were markedly quiet and uninvolved in this round, while the recent protestors were not organized. Should these elements find a way to bridge their differences and come together, they could be successful.

Persians have a different concept of time than the West. Waiting someone out is a proven strategy. The mullahs wait while the frustrations die down, allowing a new normal, and the citizenry waits for the second-longest serving Iranian leader, Khamenei'l, who is 78 and rumored to be in poor health, to join the other martyrs in heaven. Then Persian life will become really interesting.
