Women who Dare. . by Julie Bradley, editor

Bourke-White, Margaret (1906-1971), photographer

Born on June 14, 1906, in New York, NY, Margaret White studied at Columbia University, the University of Michigan, Western (now Case Western) Reserve University, and

Cornell University (A.B., 1927). She had already taken up photography, first as a hobby and then, after leaving Cornell and moving to New York City, on a freelance professional basis. There she quickly established herself as an architectural and industrial photographer. For her professional name she combined her own last name with her mother's maiden name (Bourke) to create the hyphenated form by which she was known thereafter. Beginning her professional career as an industrial and architectural photographer in 1927, she soon gained a reputation for originality, and in 1929 the publisher Henry Luce hired her for his new Fortune magazine.

While photographing the Krupp I ron Works in Germany and the First Five-Year Plan in the Soviet Union, she developed her personal photojournalistic style. She became one of the first four staff photographers for Life magazine when it began publication in 1936, and her photograph of Fort Peck Dam appeared on the cover of the first issue.

In 1935 she met the Southern novelist Erskine Caldwell, to whom she was married from 1939 to 1942. With him she collaborated on three illustrated works: You Have Seen Their Faces (1937), about Southern sharecroppers; North of the Danube (1939), on life in Czechoslovakia before the Nazi takeover; and Say, Is This the U.S.A. (1941), an American panorama.

With the outbreak of World War II, Bourke-White covered the war for Life and was the first woman photographer attached to the U.S. armed forces. Crossing the Atlantic to North Africa, her transport ship was torpedoed and sunk, but she survived to cover the bitter daily struggle of the Allied infantrymen in the I talian campaign. She then covered the siege of Moscow. Toward the end of the war, she crossed the Rhine River into Germany with General George S. Patton's Third Army troops. Her photographs of the emaciated inmates of concentration camps and of the corpses in gas chambers stunned the world.

After World War II, Bourke-White traveled to India to photograph Mahatma Gandhi. She also recorded the migration of millions of persons caused by the division of the Indian subcontinent into Hindu India and Muslim Pakistan. During the Korean War, she was a war correspondent traveling with South Korean troops.

In 1952 Bourke-White was stricken with Parkinson's disease. Subsequently, much of her time was devoted to writing, but she also continued to photograph. Two of her last photo-essays were on the Jesuits in America and on the United States as viewed from the air. She retired from Life magazine in 1969 and died in Stamford, Connecticut, on August 27, 1971.







Zonta Club of Denver General Meeting March 14, 2002

Call to order - President Cynthia Herndon called the meeting to order at the Marriott Southeast. Barbara Pellegren offered the invocation.

Minutes from February's meeting were approved as printed in the Smoke Signal.

Treasurer's Report – Nikki asked everyone to refer to the Profit / Loss Statement printed in the Smoke Signal. She also reported that there was a net profit of \$390 from the Ameila Earhart dinner. These profits were sent to the International for the Ameila Earhart Scholarship Fund.

Committee Reports

Membership: Evie reported that we had 30 people for dinner this evening with four guests. She also noted that she will be out of town and that next month's dinner reservations and cancellations should be called to Eve Childs-Best.

Service: Margaret was out of town with a family emergency so Diane reported that Committee Members had found many opportunities for "hands on" Service. Diane noted that most Club Members want projects that allow them to interact with a least one other Member. Therefore, most Service Opportunities will support that desire. She also noted that every Service Opportunity needed a coordinator to ensure that all facets of the project would be covered. Service Projects will be published in the Smoke Signal and announced at meetings. If there isn't adequate time, an attempt will be made to contact all Club Members via email and telephone. All Club Members were encouraged to bring Service Projects to the membership. More details will follow in the Smoke Signal. She also reminded everyone how important the Service Hour Forms are for the Club and encouraged everyone to complete and send in. Linda Rhea announced the Channel 9 Health Fair needed volunteers for April 20 and passed around a sign-up sheet.

Fundraising: Cathy and Jennifer reported that Fashion Show preparation is going 'smoothly' and they are ready! Nick Carter from Channel 9 will be our MC. Julie Bradley stated that we are approximately half way to our raffle sales goal. She also needs volunteers to sell raffle tickets at the Show. Public Relations: Wendy reported that erroneous information had been given to a publication. In the future, please let her know if you have provided Club information to the media or direct any inquiries to her attention; in this way the Club can be certain that the information is consistent and more important accurate. She has gotten Fashion Show information out to most of the media so our coverage should be very good.

Program

The Speaker was Linn Gunsberg. She offered reminisces about her life and things she has learned. Originally a native from New Zealand, she has had three marriages and numerous careers. She currently has a radio show on Sunday evenings on KHOW and is a clairvoyant. As a fun exercise, she performed a reading for one of our members.

Our Grant Award for the Metropolitan State College Scholarships was presented to Mary Feller and one of our previous scholarship recipients, Paula McIntire. Mary announced that this year's enrollment at Metro is the highest it has ever been (18,500) and noted that our scholarships were going to 4 different students with degree majors in: Art, Human Services and Music. Paula gave an excellent speech noting that as a single Mom, our scholarship made the difference in her being able to stay in school versus giving up her goal for a better life for herself and her child.

Elizabeth Clinton reminded everyone of the Area 3 Meeting on April 13 and encouraged everyone to send in their registration forms
