100 YEARS OF GIRL SCOUTS

On my many trips to Washington DC to visit my daughter and her family, I always took a day to go into the city on the Metro to check out museums, etc. On my last couple of trips last summer I spent quite a bit of time at the National Portrait Museum, a little off the beaten track. I was drawn to a very large portrait of a stunningly beautiful young woman in a pink dress. It is in a little alcove off by itself and really sticks out in the museum. This portrait shows the typical Southern Belle. Looking closer, I saw it was a portrait of Juliette Gordon Low, the founder of the Girl Scouts. You have probably read a lot recently about the 100 year anniversary of the Girl Scouts this month and all of the celebrations involved in that.

The story of the founder is told in a new book just out called Juliette Gordon Low: The Remarkable Founder of the Girl Scouts by Stacy A. Cordery. I don't want to go into a lot of detail about her life, but a couple of things to kindle your interest in this amazing woman. She was born into a prominent family in Savannah, Georgia, in 1860. She had a lifelong interest in the arts and was very athletic. As a young girl she suffered many ear infections, resulting in the almost total loss of hearing in one ear. In 1886 at her wedding to a wealthy Englishman, she lost the hearing in her other ear as a result of a piece of rice lodged in her good ear. In trying to get it out, the Dr. pierced her ear drum. So, she went through her adult life almost totally deaf. She helped in the war effort in WWI in hospitals, then discovered the Girl Guides in England. Looking for something meaningful in her life, she fled her unhappy marriage and returned to the US, and in March of 1912 proclaimed to a couple of friends that she was starting a new organization for girls. There were 18 girls at the first meeting.

ZONTA INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

A huge thank you to all of you who donated to the Zonta International Foundation at our January meeting as well as those who have donated previously.

As District 12 Foundation Ambassador, my stated goal for the biennium was to increase individual donations from less than 5% of the District membership to at least 12% by the end of this biennium in May, 2012. The majority of the clubs in the District bought into the goal. Because of all of them, we have increased individual donations from less than 5% to just over 22%! Instead of being in the bottom one-third for giving, our District is now 7th among ZI Districts for largest percentage of individuals.

I am so proud of our club as we had the largest number (but not largest percentage) contributing with the greatest amount donated.

THE WAR ON WOMEN CONTINUES

Violence against women is unacceptable! Yet it seems to have slipped under the Congress' radar that so many years have passed and CEDAW is still floating around without being ratified.

Now the US Senate is finally moving the VAWA (Violence Against Women) Reauthorization Act of 2011-S.1925 . No, it's not a typo. That Senate Bill has also been floating around for nearly a year.

It is difficult to understand any hesitation or foot dragging on legislation that seeks to protect women and support women who suffer from domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking.

Discussing the issue with some of my younger friends (everyone is younger then me!) it became apparent that women in their thirties and forties don't know how far women have come since the 1950's.

Most of these young women don't remember the time when classified ads were separated by jobs for women and jobs for men, whose salaries were more. Most of these young women don't remember when domestic violence was considered a "family affair" and the police would not interfere.

Pay equity is still a problem for women. And, women are the ones most affected when Social Security rolls around and they receive so much less then men do if they receive any at all.

Globally the War on Women continues to hold women back. Women are less than second class citizens in some countries. They are raped, have acid thrown in their faces if they rebel, and are denied education and proper health care.



We still have a way to go, and I think it would be a good idea for some intergenerational discussions about how we got where we are now and why the term "War on Women" is so apt at the moment.

It has been a struggle to maintain what we have gained while legislators try to bring back the 1950's. Watch Mad Men and ask about the stories of some of us who tried to achieve a bit of independence.

So what does this have to do with advocacy you ask? Advocacy is what brought us to where we are today. Women now vote; college enrollment no longer has women's quotas; and we have women lawyers, doctors, judges, politicians and pilots.

There is nothing wrong in advocating for yourself or a cause you are passionate about. It's the only way to be heard.

Now we have an answer to Dr. Freud. We know what women want-to be heard, counted and equal! -Alice B.

PASTA WITH PEAS & PESTO &...

1 lb. tri-colored pasta shapes (e.g., fusilli, rotini)
 1 T. each olive oil & salt
 10 oz. package frozen peas, thawed
 ³/₄ cup pine nuts, toasted and cooled
 ¹/₂ cup each diced yellow and red bell peppers
 1 cup chopped celery

Fresh Basil Pesto (recipe follows) or good quality jarred pesto 1-2 t. red pepper flakes (or to taste) Fresh ground pepper and salt to taste Optional – 1 cup chopped ham, or turkey, or chicken for a main course salad

Cook pasta according to package directions just until *al dente*. Drain, rinse slightly with cold water to stop cooking and transfer to a large bowl. Mix all other ingredients together (use half the basil pesto; add more as necessary). Gently toss with cooled pasta. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover and chill several hours or overnight for best flavor. Bring to room temperature 20 minutes before serving.

BASIL PESTO

2 large cloves of garlic, peeled and quartered	¹ / ₂ cup pine nuts, toasted and cooled
1 t. salt	³ / ₄ cup Romano or Parmesan cheese
2 cups fresh basil leaves, packed	1 T. lemon juice
1 T. grated lemon rind	¾ to 1 cup olive oil

Combine garlic and salt in food processor; blend to a fine paste. Add basil leaves and process to a fine mince. Add lemon rind and toasted pine nuts; process one minute until a grainy mass. Add cheese and lemon juice; process for five seconds. With motor running, add olive oil in a thin, steady stream, adding enough to produce a sauce that is like a thin, slightly runny mayonnaise. Extra can be frozen.
