HONOR DIARIES



Service

"Culture is no excuse for abuse." This is the message of *Honor Diaries*, the film presented at the sixth annual Zonta's Day of Film, on March 22. The film highlighted nine women who advocate against crimes committed against women in the name of honor. Each woman featured in the film had a personal story. One told of a sister who set herself on fire rather than dishonor her family by asking for a divorce from an abusive husband. Another told of preventing the "circumcision" of some girls in her community by presenting evidence to their father of the harm that could occur as a result of his allowing his daughters to be mutilated.

Such crimes occur primarily in Muslim-majority countries, but the idea that a woman's life is less important than a family's honor comes with some immigrant families and honor crimes occur in western countries, including the United States, as well as in other parts of the world. Several of the women advocates decried the fact that Western authorities do not do more to protect women

from such crimes, even when it should be obvious that something is wrong. Hence the film's message that culture does not excuse abuse.

The screening of the film was followed by a discussion led by Cynthia Hessin of Rocky Mountain PBS and featuring Jacqueline St. Joan, author of *My Sisters Made of Light*, and Dr. Anastasia Posadskaya-Vanderbeck, Manager of UN Women's Safe Cities Initiative. Ms St. Joan remarked on how changes in laws can lead the way toward changes in public attitudes. She gave an example of a Colorado law passed in the 1980s mandating that police follow up on reports of domestic violence, which led to an increase in the number of arrests and, she felt, a decrease in public acceptance of domestic violence.

MARILYN WARING NAMED HONORARY ZONTIAN

Zonta International has named Dr. Marilyn Waring as an honorary member of Zonta. The Zonta International Board awards lifelong International Honorary Membership to individuals who have helped to change societal attitudes about women, or have improved conditions for women beyond the national level. What follows are excerpts from ZI's press release about its honoring of Dr. Waring.

From the time she became the youngest member of the Parliament of New Zealand in 1975 at age 23, Dr. Waring has dedicated her career to advancing the status of women internationally. In particular, she is known as the principal founder of feminist economics, which argues that women's work has not traditionally been factored into economic study. Her 1988 book, If Women Counted, persuaded the United Nations to redefine gross domestic product and inspired new accounting methods in dozens of countries, all to make women a more significant factor in the economy.

"In my life I have tried to use the privileges and skills I have, and the relative safety of my precious New Zealand passport, to unapologetically speak truth to power, to serve as a bridge and access for those who are silenced, bullied or invisible. I have had feminist friends, human rights defenders, who have disappeared, been imprisoned, and faced trumped up charges. I have never had such threats, and I have never felt able to choose an easier path while my friends literally put their lives on the line.

Dr. Waring's accomplishments are vast. In the 1975 election, she became one of only four female Members of Parliament. She also served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Reserve Bank of New Zealand.

Since 2006, Dr. Waring has been a Professor of Public Policy at the Institute of Public Policy at AUT University in Auckland, New Zealand, focusing on governance and public policy, political economy, gender analysis and human rights. She has received numerous awards and accolades for her work, including the 2013 Amnesty International New Zealand's Human Rights Defender Award, a Doctor

of Letters from Glasgow Caledonian University for her outstanding international contribution towards the understanding of feminism and female human rights, and the Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit for her services to women and economics.

WOMEN OF COURAGE

The United States Department of State gives Women of Courage Awards each year. We will feature one each month and hope readers are inspired by what these individuals have accomplished.

A prominent leader in the field of maternal health, Dr. Nasrin Oryakhil is a doctor of Gynecology and Obstetrics and has been the Director of the Malalai Maternity Hospital in Kabul since 2004. In addition to providing emergency obstetric care to women, including for rural



women who come to Kabul because of medical complications, Dr. Nasrin founded, at Malalai Maternity Hospital, the first center for obstetric fistula repair in Afghanistan. Dr. Nasrin is also firmly committed to strengthening the role of women in medical professions in Afghanistan. She has increased the recognition of the essential role of midwives and supported the establishment of the Afghan Midwives Association. She is the president of the non-governmental organization Afghan Family Health Association, which is currently implementing innovative reproductive health programs, providing a hotline for youth and shelters for women, and conducting outreach sessions in high schools to raise reproductive health awareness among students. She is also an active member of the Afghan Women's Network, has spoken before the Parliament many times, has presented at professional medical conferences, and is part of the working group tasked to establish a Medical Council in Afghanistan.

Shiela will talk about "Women Gaining Power in Third World Countries as the Key Factor to Future Development."


A Glass Half Full



MARCH MEETING MINUTES

President, Wendy Henry-Moraskie called the meeting to order at 6:02 pm. Guests at the meeting:

Katie Boysen introduced her friend, Caitlyn, and Karen Silverman, Executive Director of Smart Girls.

Mary Benoit announced that Alexis Newton will join our club this Spring.

Mary Lou Edwards gave the IAM (Inspirational Advocacy Moment) about Honor Killings.

The February Minutes were approved; Kathy Hyzer, Treasurer, reported that the Audit Committee met that day (March 13, 2014) and "all is okay"; and President Wendy invited everyone to participate in dinner.

PROGRAM:

Karen Silverman, Executive Director of Smart Girls, talked to us about the impact our Grant to them will have on their training program. She said that the "big picture" of Smart Girls is social/common/emotional growth skills. Middle School girls & boys in their program learn how to set boundaries, how to build healthy relationships, nurture self-esteem and self-advocacy, and how to get help.

Ms. Silverman has been with Smart Girls for four years. Her background includes law school and volunteering at Safe House Denver where she learned about non-profits, found she loved it and has stayed there. She loves Smart Girls because it's the middle school prevention area. It was founded in 1998 by 4 women at US West, and has evolved into a peer program. Karen is responsible for transitioning Smart Girls to a structured, businesslike and sustainable program.

Smart Girls' Leadership Institute trains high school and college age girls/women to mentor middle school girls and boys. The training takes 22 hours and they can get college credit for doing it. She gave us a handout that showed the program is now in 39 different sites (7 counties in Colorado, 1 county in New York & 1 in Wyoming).

FILM EVENT:

Julie Bradley reported that the committee has received \$6800 in sponsorships; the Tattered Cover will have books for sale at the event about Honor Killings; the author of "My sisters Made of Light" will be one of the two speakers on the discussion panel; the reception is all set and won't cost us anything; there will be a door prize drawing; and she needs people to sign up to help the day of the event.

SERVICE:

Nancy McWhirter thanked everyone for their donation of underwear for Friends of the Haven at this meeting, and said that the donation item for April will be laundry detergent (high efficiency only) for Delores House. Jeanette Newville did a good job of getting much needed "undies"

purchased and delivered to Friends of the Haven. She said that Olette is concerned that our day to serve dinner for Delores House in April falls on Easter and asked if we wanted to skip that day. Kathy Hyzer and Nikki Headlee volunteered to take charge of that dinner and Judy McNerny, Helen Mulhern and Beth Mundell volunteered to help them.

DOMESTIC DIVA

Our recipe this month comes from The Delores Project Luau:

HAWAIIAN SALAD - Serves 20-25 - 2 day prep.

2--20 oz cans pineapple chunks, drained, reserve the juice
1--20 oz can crushed pineapple, drained, reserve the juice
1--16 oz pkg. acini-de-pepe (tiny pasta) - cooked, rinsed and drained
1 c. sugar
3 cans mandarin oranges, drained
2 Tbsp. flour
1/2 t. salt
1 3/4 c. pineapple juice
1--9 oz.carton Cool Whip
2 eggs, beaten
1 c. mini marshmallows optional
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 c. coconut, optional

1st day: combine sugar, flour and salt. Gradually add pineapple juice and beaten eggs. Cook over moderate heat, stirring until thickened. Add lemon juice and cool to room temperature. Add cooked, cooled pasta and stir well. Refrigerate in airtight container overnight.

2nd day: Add mandarin oranges, crushed pineapple and chunks, Cool Whip, marshmallows and coconut. Mix well. Keeps well refrigerated in airtight container up to one week. If you have questions, let me know! Thank You - Mary Lou Edwards

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Zonta Mission Reflected in Day of Film, Former US President's New Book, IMF Managing Director's Philosophy

Last week, Zonta Club of Denver members celebrated our club, our common goals, and our local and international mission, in our enthusiastic participation at our sixth annual Day of Film. The film, "Honor Diaries," celebrated a group of women who were standing up and joining together to make a difference for all women in their culture, and by extension, all oppressed women in the world.

I was again struck by the awareness that, except for the slightest featherweight change in circumstances, any of the women activists in that film - and any of us or the women we know- might be victims of systemic violence and human rights abuses.

On the morning of our Day of Film and later in the week, I heard two interviews on the radio, one with former President Jimmy Carter and another with the Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund, Christine Lagarde. I was struck by how these prominent people are echoing, unintentionally, of course, the 95-year-old mission of Zonta International.

The 39th President reports in the interview that he believes "the most serious and unaddressed worldwide challenge is the deprivation and abuse of women and girls."

He says in his new book, "A Call to Action: Women, Religion, Violence and Power," that "it is a crisis that manifests itself across the world in the form of child marriage, unequal pay, female genital mutilation, human trafficking, and more."

The interview with IMF Director Lagarde contained a stunning quote. Lagarde, speaking of a study conducted by the IMF on women in the workforce, said, "We found that if females were working in the same proportion as men do, the level of (gross domestic product) in a country like Egypt would be up 34 percent, up 27 percent in a country like India but also up 9 percent in Japan and up 5 percent in the United States. All economies have savings and productivity gains if women have access to the job market. It's not just a moral, philosophical or equal-opportunity matter. It's also an economic cause. It just makes economic sense. It's a no-brainer."
