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Project C.U.R.E. 3rd Annual "First Lady Luncheon" Raises \$2 Million

Several Zontians from Area 3 were in attendance at the 3rd Annual "First Lady Luncheon" held on Thursday, July 23rd at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Denver. The keynote speaker was the First Lady of Ghana Ernestina Naadu Mills. Approximately 1,500 people attended the luncheon of "typical" Ghanaian food of Red Cinnamon Chicken, Yellow Rice and Coconut Spinach in a baked potato, and Rum Cake with caramel sauce. It was an inspiring hour of Project C.U.R.E information provided by Dr. Douglas Jackson, Project C.U.R.E President and CEO, videos of their projects around the world and the keynote by First Lady Ernestina Naadu Mills. As if that were not enough, the banquet room was filled with the amazing colors of attendees dressed in stunning African dress.

Thanks to title sponsor MillerCoors, which underwrote the total cost of the luncheon, all the money raised at the luncheon will go directly to support the delivery of life-saving medical supplies and equipment to hospitals and clinics in Ghana.

As most of you know, ZD Zontian Cynthia Herndon is currently volunteering

for Project C.U.R.E in Malawi. There has been some discussion whether ZD might offer some volunteer service time to the local Project C.U.R.E warehouse loading boxes with supplies; further information forthcoming.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE ZONTA INTERNATIONAL WEBSITE

A UNICEF program for prevention of mother to child transmission of HIV in Rwanda is one of Zonta International's service projects for the 2008-2010 biennium.

The project description explains that in April and May of 1994 nearly 1 million Rwandans, a full 10% of the population, were killed in the Rwandan genocide. One third of those killed were

children. The genocide, combined with the brutal civil war that continued after, lead to the displacement of 3.7 million people and created hundreds of thousands of orphaned children. Throughout this terrifying time women across the country were repeatedly raped as a weapon of war.

The effects of the war, and of the pervasive use of rape as a weapon, still deeply affect this African Nation. In addition to the terrible trauma inflicted on the victims of rape, many contracted sexually transmitted diseases and half became HIV positive. The wave of HIV/AIDS that swept the nation



following the initial massacre has lead to a country where 30% of children are orphans, and 190,000 Rwandans, including 27,000 children, are HIV positive. Women in Rwanda are 1.5 times more likely to be HIV positive than men, and young women are 5 times more likely to contract HIV than young men.

Nearly 5 percent of Rwanda's pregnant women are HIV-positive and risk transmitting the virus to their babies. Of the estimated 27,000 Rwandan children living

with HIV, 90% contracted the virus during pregnancy, childbirth or breastfeeding. Almost all of these cases could have been prevented if the mother had access to proper medical treatment.

The program will expand existing services by training additional health workers, improving access to testing and treatment, and increasing community involvement, among other activities.

Our club's donations to the Zonta International Foundation help make this possible.

ADVOCACY-RATIFICATION OF CEDAW

Most of us know that the United States has not yet ratified CEDAW, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women. 185 other countries, over 90% of the members of the United Nations, have.

While I was still president of ZCD, at the urging of Denise Conroy (ZI LAA Committee Chairman) and Jackie Shapiro (ZI United Nations Committee Chairman) and after the club voted that I should, I wrote on behalf of the club to each member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. If you recall your high school civics, treaties must be ratified by the Senate, and the Foreign Relations Committee is the committee from which a proposal to ratify this treaty would go to the floor of the Senate.

Senator Barbara Boxer of California is chair of the Foreign Relations Committee subcommittee on global women's issues, and AP has reported that she plans a concerted effort to seek ratification this year, before the thirtieth anniversary of CEDAW this December .

If you believe that CEDAW should be ratified by the United States, here is an advocacy project that you can do easily—just a little time is required.

Send a letter or an email to each member of the Foreign Relations Committee. You can write your own message or you could adapt the letter I wrote (based on the suggestions from ZI). Here is my letter, without references to Zonta:

I am writing to urge you to give priority to the ratification by the United States of America of the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW).

This Convention is the most comprehensive international agreement on the basic human rights of women. It addresses women's right to equality in education, health care, employment, economics, law, property, family relations, marriage and political participation. Since it came into force as an international treaty in 1979, it has been used effectively throughout the world to advance the status of women as well as to end abuse and discrimination against women in ratifying countries.

The United States is one of the few countries in the world not to have become a party to this important legal instrument for advancing women's rights.

Ratifying CEDAW in time for its 30th anniversary in December 2009 will send an important message to the world that the promotion and protection of the rights and well-being of women and girls both here and abroad is, indeed, a priority concern of the United States.

Your action in the Committee on Foreign Relations and on the floor of the Senate in support of CEDAW ratification will confirm your commitment to promoting gender equality and ending all forms of discrimination and will be much appreciated.

You can find email addresses for the committee members through links on the committee webpage at http://foreign.senate.gov/index.html or, if you want to write an actual letter, I can mail or email you an snail mail address list that I have prepared. I can also email you a copy of the letter that I sent if that would encourage you to be an advocate for women's rights!

If you aren't convinced that CEDAW should be ratified, take the first step in being an advocate: get the facts! The text of the treaty and other information are available at http://www.un.org/ womenwatch/daw/cedaw.

The time is especially right for the U.S. to ratify CEDAW so gather facts, if you need them, turn on your computer or pick up your pen, and take *action* to "improve the legal, political, economic, health, educational and professional status of women" as we all pledge to do when we become members of Zonta.

GOTTA LOVE THOSE BEES!



The honey bee colony regulates the temperature in its nest to protect the developing brood. Whenever the bees are producing young, they maintain a temperature of 95 degrees inside the hive. In cool weather, the bees

cluster together and generate heat by consuming their high energy food, honey, and vibrating their flight muscles. In warm weather, like we are experiencing now, the bees must cool the hive. They do this by first expanding the distance between bees in the nest to allow for air circulation. If there are too many bees in the hive, some merely move outside and cling to the outside of the hive or festoon down from the landing board. The bees inside the hive actively cool the nest by bringing in water from outside sources and fanning their wings across a droplet of water. The evaporating water cools the hive. A hot, humid afternoon can find bees actively cooling the hives; if you are lucky enough to see this, you might observe the bees aligned in an orderly arrangement to carry the air out the entrance, which is at the bottom. Other bees are aligned head-down to carry heat away from the entrance.

"DUMP THAT LOSER CASSEROLE: home cookin' by Momma J"

1 can SPAM

1 12-14 OZ can of Pork-n-Beans

1 can sliced peaches

Brown Sugar

Marshmallows (large)

Butter casserole and pour in Pork-n-Beans. Layer SPAM slices on top of beans and add peach slices on top of SPAM. Sprinkle brown sugar generously on the peaches and cover with large marshmallows.

Heat the casserole thoroughly in 375 degree oven until marshmallows turn brown on top. (Momma J says her kids loved this, but trust her, the "boyfriend" will not...I just wish she'd told me this before I made it to impress a boyfriend with my skill of home cooking...).

(The identity of Momma J cannot be disclosed—she may have another boyfriend some day!)

Bees, continued

The honey bee colony is effective in regulating the temperature of its nest. During the dead of winter, when the queen is not producing brood, the bees don't waste energy heating the hive to 95 degrees; they only warm the cluster of bees to about 70 degrees. They also conserve energy by not trying to warm the entire hive cavity, just the cluster of bees. For cooling the hive, the bees devote a number of workers to fanning tasks. When the summer temperatures rise into the high 90s, the bees stop their normal activities and begin foraging for water. Bees foraging for pollen and nectar will redirect their efforts to bringing water back to the hive.
