ZONTIANS IN THE KITCHEN

CHICKEN AND WILD RICE CASSEROLE

a variation on Paula Deen’s recipe – serves 6-8

Ingredients:

- 3 cups cooked diced chicken
- 1 6-oz. box long grain and wild rice prepared per directions
- 1 4-oz. jar diced pimentos
- 1 8-oz. can water chestnuts, drained and chopped
- 1 10³/₄ oz. can condensed cream of celery soup
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 cup finely shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Directions:

Mix the first 6 ingredients together. Pour into 3 qt. buttered casserole dish. Bake covered at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Top with cheese and heat until bubbly.

MARGARITA FRUIT SALAD

a variation on a recipe from Cuervo – serves 8

Ingredients:

- cantaloupe cut into small chunks (about 3 cups)
- pineapple cut into small chunks (about 3 cups)
- 4 cups fresh strawberries sliced
- 1/2 cup margarita mix
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice (key limes are best)

Directions:

Mix liquids together and set aside. Assemble fruit. Pour dressing over fruit and gently mix well. Chill.

THE WISH LIST

Ongoing needs, the stuff there is never enough of:

- Liquid hand soap (gallon size preferred)
- Disposable gloves (latex medical and food service)
- Multipurpose cleaner, bleach (gallon refill size preferred)
- Trash bags (all sizes)
- Household items, new or used
- Coffee cups
- Silverware, serving utensils
- Brooms, dust pans, vacuums
- Bath towels, wash cloths
- Blankets, quilts (twin size preferred)

Pillows, pillowcases (standard size preferred)

Water pitchers (plastic preferred)

They are very picky about the clothes they accept, because their storage space is limited. They can always use:

- New underwear
- New T-shirts (including promotional t-shirts from an event)
- New sweat pants and shirts

ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

CEDAW.....AGAIN? STILL?

Would you believe that we are at it again? Trying to have CEDAW ratified by the United States? The ONLY industrialized nation who has not ratified the only instrument to protect women.

It's definitely time for major action to push this through once and for all. And that means working together and working hard. If you truly believe in this issue, you won't be shy about saying so to your elected officials.

Remember—they need our vote! No matter how much money is poured into a campaign, they still need our vote. Let Colorado Senators know what you want.

Representing Colorado for Zonta as the District 12 LAA, it is my plan to reach out to our three other states, Montana, South Dakota and Wyoming to form a coalition that will show the power of numbers and the strength of women's power.

I recently received an email newsletter from DÉMOS, a non-partisan public policy research and advocacy organization founded in 2000. DÉMOS has a project called the Women's Leadership Initiative headed by Linda Tar-Whelan, former Ambassador to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, former Deputy Assistant for Women's Concerns under President Carter, and a DÉMOS Distinguished Senior Fellow. Ms. Tar-Whelan, at the end of her article, *The Unfinished Business of Ratification*, gives us the action items to move forward:

- Sign up at www.cedaw2010.org to get all the latest information.
- Write a letter to the editor of your local paper to say why you personally feel that it is imperative for the US to join the rest of the world on speaking up for the equality of women and girls. It is a shame

to turn our backs on international cooperation and stand with the only other non-ratifying nations—Sudan, Iran, Somalia, Nauru, Palau and Tonga—instead of being a global leader.

- Write your Senators to ask them to vote for women this year and ratify CEDAW. Be sure to write a personal story if you can about why this matters.
- Write President Obama and ask for quick action in 2010. Thirty years is long enough to wait for the United States to stand up and be counted.
- Check the list of organizations that are supporting CEDAW and if Zonta is not listed start the process of joining the campaign.
- If you are a student, schedule a program or event on campus and online to spread the word.

CLUB TREASURER

At the August meeting, club members will be asked to approve a Board proposal involving the Discretionary Fund.

For new members, the Discretionary Fund is sort of the club's savings account (although the funds are invested and earn a little more than a savings account). This fund is used to pay the expenses for our delegate to attend District Conferences and International Conventions. Also, if we end the fiscal year with a deficit, we "plug" the budget by moving the amount of the deficit from the Discretionary Fund to the club's Operating Fund. This allows us to avoid raising club membership dues.

For the past several years, we have had at least \$9,000

in the checking account after reimbursement from Discretionary. We have that additional money in the checking account because there were some years, in the distant past, when we took more money in than went out. In accounting terms that is called net assets. Our accountant has advised us to keep a minimum of \$5,000 in the checking account.

We ended the 2009-10 fiscal year with a deficit of \$1,678.71. The Board, at its July meeting, voted not to reimburse Operating from Discretionary this time. Now we will ask for the members' approval.

We also will be presenting the proposed 2010-2011 budget for Club approval.

With regard to bylaws amendments, the voting took 12 hours for 27 amendments and 4 resolutions (that was one long day). I will put together a spreadsheet to cover all of the votes rather than go through each one. Some of the results you will be happy about, some not. Some only had to do with the change of a few words; some created a firestorm of discussion that seemed unending. That being said (this is for all you Parliamentarian Geeks out there), I learned a boat-load of Parliamentary Procedure. Some folks know it well, some have no idea but keep trying, some think it cumbersome and old fashioned and sometimes even President Beryl Sten and others at the podium needed help with procedure. The official Parliamentarian Betty Green had her expertise requested frequently and had her own questions of herself (wuh?). Why is it still used? I am told because of our work with the



UN programs, true or not, I personally have no idea how to wrangle the questions and comments of 31,354 Zontians from all over the world without it. Probably the most contentious votes had to do with raising International dues \$15 US a year (*passed*), followed by an amendment (*not passed*) that would require local clubs to invite new members only if they are "...actively engaged in a recognized business or profession in a decision-making capacity" (read *not* retired).

If you want to discuss either of these at the August meeting, please let Kathy Hyzer know so it can be included in the agenda or give me a call.
