BILLBOARD ADVOCACY

Boulder Foothills, Betty Edwards, Past Governor and member of the Zonta Club of the Pike Peak Area and I ventured off to Niagara Falls, Ontario for the Zonta North American Inter District Meeting. After an early morning flight, storm delays, and normal travel hassles we arrived at the Buffalo International Airport. While waiting in line for our rental car I spotted the Buffalo newspaper. We all know human trafficking is everywhere, but little did we know that we would be met with such a headline and billboard as pictured above. It was just in time for the arrival of Zontians and it was amazing. We bought all of the papers and shared with others at the conference.

Betty and I staved Monday for some rest and relaxation. We had a motel booked close to the

Buffalo airport for that night and an early Tuesday morning flight. On our way to Buffalo and just after we crossed into the US Betty broke the news to me that she wanted to see the human trafficking billboard up close and personal. Now the only map we had was the very small Avis Rental Car map of Buffalo. With a lot of urging and perseverance, mostly on Betty's part, we actually found the billboard without getting lost. It was in a semi-industrial part of town perched on the top of an auto detailing business. The owner of the business, a very tall and muscular African-American man, became quite curious when we started to take pictures of the billboard. He came out to talk to us. This was a golden

opportunity for Betty to do what she does best talk about human trafficking. As founder of the Southern Colorado Human **Trafficking Task** Force, this is her

passion. She is not only passionate, she is knowledgeable. We asked the business owner if he was given any information about human trafficking when the billboard was erected. He wasn't, so Betty took care of that situation by giving him a brochure. information and a stack of the small tri-folds with the 800# emergency number for any suspected trafficking situation. Betty asked what he knew about human trafficking and his answer, "Well, you would have to be pretty stupid not to realize something is going on when people just disappear," was a very tothe-point answer by an average citizen who got caught up by something he had no control of.

The United Nations has estimated that 2.5 million people are in forced labor, including sexual exploitation, at any given time. It remains one of the most underreported crimes in the world. A recent report by the U.N.'s Office of Drugs and Crime noted that trafficking for sexual exploitation accounts for 58 percent of all trafficking cases detected globally. Meanwhile, the share of detected cases involving forced labor has doubled over the past four years to 36 percent. Victims can be found in restaurants. fisheries, brothels, and construction sites. Women and girls together account for about 75 percent of all trafficking victims, both for sex and for labor, according to the U.N.

- 1. Served over 2,000 unduplicated girls through comprehensive after school and summer programs that are gender, age, and culturally appropriate.
- 2. Delivered 75,000 curriculum hours including 15,000 of academic tutoring.3. Provided daily transportation to GIMD to 15 area schools.
- 4. Offered paid summer internships to four girls in 10^{th} - 12^{th} grade.

GIRLS INC. UPDATE

- 5. Delivered comprehensive outreach programs at 20 local schools and organizations.
- 6. Awarded \$80,000 in college scholarships to GIMD alumni.
- 7. Supported the following short-term outcomes for girls: increase in skills and knowledge; exposure to critical issues facing girls; development in positive self-image; development of resiliency skills.
- 8. Supported the following intermediate outcomes for girls: increase in selfesteem, self-efficacy, future outlook; reduction in risky behavior and teen pregnancy rates; improved grades and

school attendance; advancement in grade; ability to manage and avoid negative relationships; and developed peer and adult support networks.

"WOMAN PUTS FACE ON STRUGGLE TO SUCCEED"

So read the headline in the *Arvada Press's* June 27 <u>story</u> about Jennine Jeffries who, if you can't quite place the name, is one of ZCD's Metro scholarship students.

The story reported that

Jennine came from a "broken and abusive childhood home," grappled with substance





abuse and legal problems as a younger person, and has four children including a 19-year-old son and four -year-old twins.

However, she is determined to succeed. "Given the pain I have put my family through, given the pain I have put myself through, given the struggles I have been through, I want a career where I can help those who are like me, women in transition, women who feel that maybe they're not worthy, or that they have no hope," she says. "I want to make a difference in people's lives."

Iennine has worked for the Metro Institute for Women's Studies and Services, and is currently an intern at Project WISE (another familiar name). Despite her volunteer work, her paying jobs, and her long commute to Metro, Jennine has a 3.97 grade point average. She will graduate next spring. Yet, Jennine worries about how, as a new college graduate, she will be able to earn the \$40,000 she will need to take care of her family without the housing, food stamps and Medicaid benefits she currently receives.

"I'm terrified that once I graduate I won't be self-sufficient."

The story about this woman that ZCD has been fortunate enough to be able to help is one of a series about the "cliff effect." The cliff effect occurs when even a modest increase in income leads to a complete termination of a benefit and a large net loss to the family. Go here for links to other articles in the series.

DOMESTIC DIVA

Pie for Breakfast

1 ready-to-eat 9" pie crust 6 oz. baby spinach ½ cup half and half or whipping cream 4 eggs
½ cup sour cream
1/3 cup sun-dried
tomatoes, drained
and chopped

1/4 t. freshly-ground black pepper salt to taste 1 - 7/8 cup (7.5 oz.) shredded cheddar

Preheat oven to 350° F. Spray nine-inch pie plate with nonstick spray; place pie crust into pan; flute edges. Microwave spinach in a bowl until wilted, about two minutes. Cool, squeeze dry and coarsely chop. Beat eggs and add half and half, sour cream, tomatoes, pepper and salt. Stir in spinach and one and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of cheese. Blend well; pour into crust. Bake 35 minutes until crust is browned and internal temperature is 160° F. Top with remaining cheese. Let stand at room temperature five minutes and serve.




