Third, Fundraising still has some coffee to sell that will make terrific



# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FROM THE ZONTA INTERNATIONAL WEBSITE

### December 4, 2009 – Right Livelihood Award Ceremony

Congratulations to Dr Catherine Hamlin (Ethiopia), Zonta International Honorary Member, who is awarded the Right Livelihood Award 2009 "for her fifty years dedicated to treating obstetric fistula patients, thereby restoring the health, hope and dignity of thousands of Africa's poorest women". The prize money is EUR 50,000.

On December 4th parliamentarians, ambassadors, members of the board and jury of the Right Livelihood Award Foundation and invited guests from civil society, business and media among others will gather at the Swedish Parliament in Stockholm to honour the 2009 Award Recipients.

The Swedish Deputy Prime Minister Maud Olofsson will together with the Vice President of the European Commission Margot Wallström present the Awards to the Laureates.

The Award is widely known as the Alternative Nobel Prize and is presented annually in Stockholm, Sweden, at a ceremony in the Swedish Parliament.

The Award is usually shared by four recipients. Often an Honorary Award is given to a person or group whose work the Jury wishes to recognize but who is not primarily in need of monetary support. The others share the prize money of EUR 150,000. The prize money is for ongoing successful work, never for personal use (to read more: <a href="https://www.rightlivelihood.org">www:rightlivelihood.org</a>).

Dr Hamlin was presented the Zonta International Honorary insignia at a ceremony in Gothenburg, Sweden in 1997 by Past International President Margit Webjörn (then ZI Director) and President Beryl Sten (then D21 Governor) per request by then D24 Governor Jane Wilson O'Brien.

At the Convention 2000 in Hawaii Dr Hamlin was a keynote speaker and received at that time a substantial financial contribution from Zonta for her fistula work.

(Editor's note: Dr. Hamelin co-founded the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital and was featured in A Walk to Beautiful, shown at Zonta's Day of Film 2009.)

# MESSAGE ON THE INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN New York, 25 November 2009

In the ten years since the General Assembly designated 25 November as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women, the circle of engagement has widened. More groups and individuals, including men and boys, are getting involved in efforts to prevent and address this heinous violation of women's human rights.

There has also been significant progress at the national level as many countries have adopted laws and comprehensive action plans. However, much work lies ahead. In

every country, women and girls continue to be plagued by violence, causing tremendous suffering. Such violence undermines development, generates instability, and makes peace that much harder to achieve. We must demand accountability for the violations, and take concrete steps to end impunity. We must listen to and support the survivors. Our goal is clear: an end to these inexcusable crimes -- whether it is the use of rape as a weapon of war, domestic violence, sex trafficking, so-called "honour" crimes or female genital mutilation/cutting. We must address the roots of this violence by eradicating discrimination and changing the mindsets that

perpetuate it.

The "UNiTE to End Violence Against Women" campaign that I launched last year is galvanizing action across the United Nations system. It calls for all countries to put in place, by the year 2015, strong laws, multi-sectoral action plans, preventive measures, data collection, and systematic efforts to address sexual violence in conflict situations. I invite governments, organizations and individuals to join us in this Campaign. I have also just launched a Network of Men Leaders to strengthen our advocacy. The UN General Assembly's support for the creation of a new gender equality entity will also

bolster our work. The new entity will promote gender equality and the empowerment of women, and hold the UN system itself accountable for supporting measures to eliminate discrimination against women and end violence against them.

Women around the world are the very linchpin keeping families, communities, and nations together. On this International Day, let us reaffirm our commitment to women's human rights; let us invest more resources in countering this violence; and let us do all it takes to end these horrific assaults once and for all.

### The Delores Project

The Delores Project is named for Delores Big Boy, a Lakota woman who frequently lived on the streets of Denver. Her situation was complicated by health, developmental and substance abuse issues, as well as physical and sexual violence. Although Delores sought aid from various Denver agencies, sadly, she fell through the cracks in the system. Delores died while living on the streets June 8, 1999. In forming the shelter in 2000, her memory is honored with the project's continuing commitment to ensure safe shelter for every woman and support for those in transition.

There is a committed crew of Zonta Denver members who volunteer on a regular basis to provide a hot, home-cooked Sunday evening meal for the women of Delores Project. Each month, a thoughtful menu is planned, executed and hand served. While this may not be a satisfying

volunteer project for all of Zonta Denver's members, it is important to recognize those members who plan, buy food, cook and serve on the third Sunday in each month. I can speak for myself, I do not volunteer every month, but when I do, it feels amazing.

Of note, as the weather turns colder, the number of women finding warmth at Delores is increasing. For the first time when we served in November, there were cots set up in the dining area. The Program Directors said they were 20 women over their bed limit. Please, help with this simple but meaningful project. If you can't cook or serve, consider contributing a few dollars to help with some of the food or making a holiday

donation of one of the items on the wish list below....it would be greatly appreciated and believe me when I say, the women of Delores Project are humbly, and quietly honored, with what Zonta Denver does.

### DELORES PROJECT WISH LIST

Ongoing needs, the stuff there is never enough of:

Liquid hand soap (gallon size preferred)

Disposable gloves (latex medical and food service)

Multipurpose cleaner, bleach (gallon refill size preferred)

Trash bags (all sizes)

Household items, new or used

Coffee cups

Silverware, serving utensils
Brooms, dust pans, vacuums
Bath towels, wash cloths
Blankets, quilts (twin size preferred)

Blankets, quilts (twin size preferred Pillows, pillowcases (standard size preferred)

They are very picky about the clothes they accept, because their storage space is limited. They can

Since there would only be so much room for these items it would be prudent to contact The Delores Project before donating.

A carpet cleaning service willing to clean carpets, no charge.

If you have questions, please ask!

The Service Committee will continue to collect beverages for The Delores Project at club meetings—coffee, tea, hot chocolate or any other dry drink mixes. So as you shop, clip coupons or just generally feel like making the lives of the women at Delores better please purchase some beverages. You may also bring the beverages when you come to serve dinner.

Your opinion is important! Take it from a former State Representative....me.

In a democracy, state and national officials are elected to represent the constituents of their districts. Elected officials work for you. As a citizen, you have not only a right but a responsibility to convey your opinions and concerns to your elected officials.

How would I know what you want? What you like? What you don't like? And what you want me to do? Your voice is important as an individual, constituent, taxpayer, and average citizen.

HAVE YOU HEARD OF SECURITY

**COUNCIL RESOLUTION 1325?** 

UNITED NATIONS

This resolution passed unanimously at UN Security Council in October 2000.

It is a resolution on Women, Peace and Security. In addition this historical resolution has critical implications: protection of women in armed conflict, participation of women in conflict prevention, resolution and reconstruction.

One of the most important pieces of 1325 is mainstreaming women within the UN system. The UN Secretary General is obligated to increase women in decision making in conflict resolution and the peace process.

So how's it working? And what does Zonta have to do with this resolution? Let's take a look at Zonta and CEDAW. Violence against women is one of the issues Zonta has on its action agenda. Let's not overlook our NGO as one of the working organizations at the UN. How can we support their work on a local level?

Violence against women gained public attention largely because of the grass-roots work of organizations like Zonta and movements around the world. The interaction between women's advocacy and United Nations' initiatives has been a driving factor in establishing violence against women as a human rights issue on the international agenda.

Zonta Denver, as well as all Colorado Zonta clubs, has an obligation to pursue this endeavor on a local, state and international level.

District Conference – Sheila Davis reported that out of 110 registered to attend, 97 made it in spite of the blizzard. The Conference was a big success. All scheduled speakers made it through the snow. The only casualty was the Thursday evening dinner, scheduled at Kate's, had to be cancelled. Sheila recommends having one of our dinner meetings there in the near future in appreciation of the manager's understanding of the cancellation. The Friday night costume dinner/party was a hoot. The Saturday evening dinner and entertainment was fun. The speakers were wonderful and inspiring. And the birthing kit service project was a huge hit.

Nikki gave an update on the chapel items being stored in her garage.

Minnie Lundberg, Evie Ashmore and Judy Bederman announced the 2008-2009 Zontian of the Year Award was presented to Sheila Davis at the District Conference. A gift and roses were given to her and roses were, also, given to last year's recipient Minnie.
