RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE DINNERS

The Ronald McDonald House in Denver provides a "home away from home" for families whose children are being treated at Children's Hospital. It's located at 1300 E. 21st Ave, Denver, CO 80203, just a couple of blocks from the hospital. Their phone number is 303-832-2667. Families have individual hotel rooms for sleeping and relaxing, and there are two beautiful, very large kitcheas located on the 2nd and 3rd floors. Individuals can fix

and relaxing, and there are two beautiful, very large kitchens and eating areas located on the 2nd and 3rd floors. Individuals can fix their own meals, or be served by volunteer organizations such as ours. The Zonta Club of Denver serves dinner for approximately 30-35 people in a buffet style format the third Monday of each month. Volunteers are asked to arrive at 5:30pm for set up, and serving begins at 6:00pm.

The Zonta monthly coordinator's role is to contact other volunteers who offered to prepare and serve dinner that month, plan a menu, and determine who brings each dish. Volunteers' names will be identified here in the Smoke Signal, on the service opportunities clipboard brought to the monthly dinner meetings, and through Sheila Davis. Zontians have found this service event to be one of the most rewarding activities we do, so please sign up if you have not been a part of this project in the past!

Volunteers for February are Shari Dorton, Diane Twining, Evie Ashmore, and Mary Benoit. So far, Mandy Ziegler is the only volunteer for March. Three more women are needed. Thanks to Evie Ashmore, Linda Rhea, Kathy Hyzer, and Nikki Headlee for preparing and serving at the January dinner.

Facts about women in the Antarctic:

First woman to step ashore in Antarctica: Caroline Mikkelsen, wife of a Norwegian whaling captain, landing on the eastern coast of Antarctica Feb. 20, 1935.

First women to spend a year in the Antarctic: Edith Ronne and Jennie Darlington in 1947-48 on Stonington I sland near the Antarctic Peninsula.

First woman to give birth in Antarctica: The wife of chief officer at Argentina's Esperanza Base on Jan. 7, 1978.

First woman to do research in Antarctica: Prof. Marie V. Klenova, a Russian marine geologist, in summer 1956 aboard the Russian icebreakers Ob and Lena and at the Russian base Mirny.

First American woman to research in Antarctica: Christine Muller-Schwarze studying penguin behavior in October 1969 at Cape Crozier.

First women to the South Pole: geochemist Lois Jones, Terry Lee Tickhill, Eileen McSaveney, Kay Lindsay, reporter Jean Pearson, and New Zealand biologist Pam Young in 1969.

First American woman to head an Antarctic research station: Dr. Mary Alice McWhinnie in 1974, after working on US research ships from 1962 to 1972.

First nun to spend a winter in Antarctica: Sister Mary Odile Cahoon in 1974.

People make the Ice an experience By Karen Murphy

On Oct. 2, I stepped off a C-141 onto the continent of Antarctica for the very first time. A new found friend told me not to hurry when I got off the plane, but stop and turn full circle. The ice sparkled, Mount Erebus was puffing, the air was crisp on my cheeks and the military plane I just got off was enormous. I was awed, excited and scared at the same time. It was my first time here and I knew that I would never experience these moments again.

A first timer. We're a little embarrassed to be one because when others refer to us as such it's not a compliment. We're the tourists in town. We show child-like awe at everything around us with our mouths gaping at the beauty of the landscape. We are judgmental, arrogant, believing we could do things better because we are smart, educated and experienced beyond our positions — so we may think.

In a little more than seven weeks on the Ice I've grown to love all the good things about being new. I am still wowed every time I come out of my dorm and see a glimpse of the Royal Society Range. And I cannot wait to see how Winter Quarters Bay will look when the vessel arrives. I cannot imagine it now and I know this will be the only season I can say that. We all need to acknowledge and appreciate the excitement of the first season and hope others who have been here before can, at times, remember how the first season felt.

To appreciate being in Antarctica for the first time or to recapture the feeling of the first time, we must be open to remembering all the memorable first times in our life—going to school, making friends, moving away from home, falling in love, making love. Other firsts might include losing a pet, losing a loved one, getting divorced, almost losing a loved one through illness. One common thread to these experiences is emotion.

Emotion cements memories. There are no events remem-

bered well, joyful or painful, that do not stir strong feelings. My first time in Antarctica is and will be no different. I will always remember my first look at Mount Erebus, penguins walking on the runway and seals lazily lying around on the ice looking like slugs. However, more than any scenery or wildlife, I will remember all the remarkable people I have met—people who have given of themselves generously without a second thought.

I am fortunate to work in the housing office because it allows me to meet everyone on station, from those who are new like me to those who have come for many seasons. I have met so many smart, funny, creative and caring people.

People who on their day off give tours to newcomers, those who offer classes in their free time to share music, exercise, dance or the history of Antarctica. And, those who simply do something nice for you.

There are so many. The person half my age who cared enough to ask me how I was doing when he knew I might be having a rough time; the person who made me a CD just because; the person who gave me his phone card when he learned I hadn't brought one; the people who wished me a happy birthday and those who trucked out to the sea ice runway with me and walked back together because they knew that was what I wanted to do on my birthday; the person who sang me Happy Birthday in Swedish, the person who carved me a penguin, the person who nicknamed me "Karry-On." There are so many more.

Just three weeks ago, I was calling this Papillon On Ice, in reference to an old movie where a guy is sent to a prison camp on a tropical island. Now I know leaving will be poignant.

In the end, we go to a place for the first time, but what we find are these people.



Karen Murphy works for McMurdo Station's housing office and said one of the goals still on her to-do list is to hike to the top of Observation Hill, just outside of McMurdo. So far, she's completed the Armitage Loop, which is a flagged trail on the sea ice from McMurdo to New Zealand's Scott Base on the other side of Ob Hill.

Although the funds were originally available only to help members of the Zonta Club of Denver, through court approval, the scope of the gift has been broadened so that if all of the funds available have not been used to help members of the Zonta Club of Denver, assistance can be given to other Zontians and former Zontians in Colorado.

If you know of anyone who meets the Zonta membership qualifications set forth on the enclosed request for information, wand who you think has a real need for financial assistance due to age, illness, or other circumstances, please complete and mail the request for information as soon as possible. We will send to you an application for funding. Please note information that is provided in the application concerning the individual needing assistance will be known only to the members of the Hershey Charitable Trust Committee and the President and Treasurer of the Zonta Club of Denver who are responsible for requesting and distributing funds.

Sincerely, Evie Ashmore, President Zonta Club of Denver Please send me a Hershey Charitable Trust application for funding. I know of an individual who is elderly, ill or needy, who has an actual need for financial assistance and who meets one of the Zonta membership criteria below:

- 1. Persons who have been or were in the past, members of the Zonta Club of Denver for ten years or more.
- Persons who have been, or were in the past, members of any Zonta Club in District XII, Area 3 for ten years or more.
- 3. Persons who have been, or were in the past, members of any Zonta Club in the State of Colorado for ten years or more.
- 4. Persons who are currently members of the Zonta Club of Denver and who have been members of that club for five years or more.
- 5. Persons who are currently members of any Zonta Club in the State of Colorado who have been members of that club for five years or more.

I understand that because of requirements imposed by the Internal Revenue code on the Trust, the intended recipient will be required to submit financial information to qualify for assistance, but that such information will be circulated only to members of the Hershey Charitable Trust Committee and the President and Treasurer of the Zonta Club of Denver, and will be kept strictly confidential.

Founded March 11, 1927, the club has championed improvement in the status of women to the tune of more than \$2

million in donations over the years and countless hours of volunteer service. It's chartered under Zonta International, which boasts 1,188 clubs and approximately 35,000 members in 71 countries.

Every year since 1988, the Zonta Club of Denver has funded several scholarships to Metro of varying amounts. And in June, the club initiated an endowed scholarship with a gift of more than \$29,000, thanks to provisions in the will of Edna Jean Hershey—a member from 1935 until her death in 1977.

Hershey was born in Denver in 1904. She earned several degrees from various Colorado universities and worked for the Denver Public Schools for more than 25 years. Her will outlined provisions for a charitable trust to assist needy Zontians—as club members are called. However, according to Evie Ashmore, president of the Denver club, there weren't a lot of requests from members for financial assistance. "The folks were not coming out to the woodwork," Ashmore says.

Zonta didn't want the money to go to waste, so club members asked the courts to approve a revision to the trust's directive. They requested and received permission to use any excess money for scholarships every three years—scholarships that are given to Metro State students in Hershey's honor.

"We're committed to serving the community," says Ashmore, adding that Metro's downtown location and dedication to the many "ladies going there" makes the relationship worthwhile. The club often includes new of its scholars' progress in newsletters and invites them to club events. "It lets folks know that there are really deserving gals out there who are making it, but need some help, " Ashmore says, "As corny as it sounds, it's wonderful that we can be a part of that."
