



Denver Kids Proposal for Funding

Background:

At the monthly dinner meeting in August of 2003, the request to fund \$10,000 for Denver Kids (DK) for the year 2006-2007, made by the service committee, was turned down by the general membership. The service committee was asked to investigate the concerns, and make a proposal in February of 2004. The issue was discussed at length in the November service committee meeting. A 1st draft proposal was created and additional information was requested regarding past funding levels. At the January service committee meeting a spreadsheet of past spending was reviewed. The average DK funding for the past ten years out of the Zonta Denver Service (ZDS) Inc. and Service funds was 16% total. The average DK funding for the past ten years out of ZDS Inc. fund was 22%. After much thoughtful discussion a proposal for DK was drafted and presented to the Zonta Board on 1/22/04. The following funding proposal was agreed up and will be presented to the general membership on 2/12/04:

Proposal:

- Do not fund DK 3 years in advance.
- * Give between 7-20% of the ZDS Inc. and Service funds every year for the next year only. The service committee will recommend the % in October for distribution the following February as shown:

Feb 2004 \$ 10,000 (pre-allocated)

Feb 2005 \$ 10,000 (pre-allocated)

Oct 2005 Service committee recommends 7-20%

for Feb 2006 distribution

Oct 2006 Service committee recommends 7-20%

for Feb 2007 distribution

- * Remain a sponsor of DK.
- * Continue to allocate dollars for general funds.
- * Fund \$500 each year out of the Service account as a suggested donation to DK for the current year's Zonta president's use. This amount will be included in the 7-20% allocation beginning in 2006. This allocation would begin in 2004, however.
- * Have a DK Moment each quarter presented by the current Zonta members on the DK Board.
- * Have a dinner program dedicated to DK each year.
- * Assign a DK coordinator from the service committee to find and set up service events for Zonta members.
- Assign a fair market value to in-kind contributions, such as the annual awards banquet and golf tournament.

Service Grant Recipients Feb, 12th

Denver Kids, Inc.

Most of the children in the Denver Kids Program are the 1st generation to finish high school and due to this program 75% go on to finish a 2yr or 4yr college.

Rape Awareness and Assistance Program

Classes for age 9 to 12 emphasis on safety, this is the only program of its kind in Denver. With our help 350 women were helped and a total of 1,065 women were served last year.

Salvation Army

40% of kids in the program are from single parent households, the Starlite program focuses on girls ages 6 to 18 with about 100 kids are in the program this year. The program emphasizes learning teamwork and our grant money will purchase new uniforms for the kids. The program encourages rewards for good grades, etc. The team may go to the Rose Bowl this year. The lowest GPA on the team is 2.4

Work Options for Women

Helps low income women gain job readiness skills with a goal to work self out of poverty. The program focuses on job readiness, work ethic, proper work conduct. The organization teaches culinary and food service training, with the goal of a full time job with benefits and self sufficiency.

After a job is obtained the organization follows up with the woman for a full year

Samaritan Counseling Center

There are 12 therapists who help low income women with approximately 700 sessions per year. The budget is approximately \$2,000 per month. The sessions are offered at \$20 per session, which is well under market rate.

Rocky Mountain Parents as Teachers

This organization helps mostly single women who have not had a positive role model experience in parenting. Three neighborhoods are helped; Columbine, South Lincoln, and Westwood. A representative of the organization meets with the mother or parents one hour a month until the child is in school. They train the parents on coping strategies, positive parenting, and in addition focus on literacy by bringing books to share and providing library cards.

Day of Caring for Breast Cancer

This is a day long seminar focusing on education and help regarding breast cancer. There will be approximately 1,000 attendees and 40 seminars. There will be a fashion show. There is a directory of service providers published each year. There is also a sense of security financial resources program.

Women's Bean Project

With the funds raised, there is an educational and income generating program focusing on job skills, attendance, anger management. 90% of the women in the program do not have a high school degree. With the goal of finding permanent housing, the program employs 14 women in 2 businesses. The Zonta funds will provide a scholarship to two women who will obtain training in phlebotomy.



PEACE X PEACE AND GLOBAL GIRLFRIEND HOST DOCUMENTARY ON WOMEN WAGING PEACE WORLDWIDE

Littleton, Colorado - After premiering at the United Nations Headquarters in October of 2003, PEACE X PEACE and local company Global Girlfriend are proud to host the Colorado premiere of *PEACE BY PEACE:* Women on the Frontlines at St. Philip Lutheran Church in Littleton on International Women's Day, Monday March 8, 2004. This breakthrough documentary profiles women peace-builders in five nations: Afghanistan, Argentina, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Burundi and the United States, documenting their work to rebuild their communities and nations after the devastation of conflict and crisis.

"The documentary shows these women as they are rebuilding communities. It does not have to be after a specific war or genocide, but anything where a society is broken and fractured," explains Executive Producer, Patricia Smith Melton. "Peace takes work, and the work that women are doing to restore harmony is a largely untapped potential right now. It is possibly the largest power we have to bring harmony back to our world."

Studies show that in today's conflicts, civilians constitute 90 percent of the casualties of war - the majority of whom are women and children. Women and children are also the majority of the world's refugees and displaced persons. Yet despite the brutality against women worldwide, valiant women from such conflict and crisis zones as Afghanistan, Argentina, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Burundi and the United States in the aftermath of September 11th, have shown the courage and strength to rebuild ravaged communities by creating the conditions necessary for sustainable peace. These are the women who are featured in *PEACE BY PEACE: Women on the Frontlines*.

Narrated by Academy Award-winning actress, Jessica Lange, *PEACE BY PEACE: Women on the Frontlines* takes viewers into the lives of women who are engaged in the often ignored aspects of peace building. The documentary profiles one of the seven women drafting Afghanistan's new Constitution; female leaders of the unemployed workers promoting participatory democracy in Argentina; community builders providing micro-credit loans to women in Bosnia-Herzegovina; Hutu and Tutsi women working together to promote truth and reconciliation though a peace radio station in Burundi; and women in the United States who lost family members on 9/11, and who are now leading the search for peace in the war on terror.

Woven between these intimate portraits are both historical footage of the violence that devastated their societies and interviews with international female experts on diverse aspects of peace building. The interviews provide the context of what is needed for sustainable peace and how women are finding ways to answer this call. The experts include I sabel Allende, Chilean-American author and humanitarian; Dr. Azizah al-Hibri, Founder-Director of Muslim Women Lawyers for Human Rights; Noeleen Heyzer, Executive Director of UNI FEM; Susan Collin Marks, Executive Vice President of Search for Common Ground; and Jean Shinoda Bolen, Jungian analyst and author.

Along with the documentary, the evening will feature a Women's Organization Open House with information and shopping booths provided by local women's groups including The Women's College of the University of Denver, The Women's Bean Project, Women's Vision Foundation, Maya Wavers, Joy House, Global Girlfriend and more. The open house begins at 6:30pm until 9:30pm. The documentary screening and program will run from 7:00pm until 8:30pm. St. Philip Lutheran Church is located at 7531 S. Kendall Blvd. at Ken Caryl Ave. in Littleton.

MINUTES - of November 13, 2003 general membership meeting were approved as written.

TREASURER'S REPORT - was given by Judy Allen. The Treasurer's Report will be filed for auditing.

COMMITTEE REPORTS -

<u>Membershi</u>p – Kathy Hyzer and Cathy Conley indicated that 39 ladies and one gentlemen were present, and that the raffle paid for two guest dinners.

<u>Service Committee</u> – report was given by Sheila Davis. Sheila appreciates members indicating their service hours, and mentioned that email works well to record these hours. The December and January Ronald McDonald dinners were a success; the Bell Ringing for Salvation Army for the holidays was also a success. Other projects have included Santa Claus Shop and helping sponsor a family at Christmas. Upcoming projects include Feb Ronald McDonald and serving lunch at the Gathering Place, Denver's daytime homeless shelter, on Mar 10 and 11, from 11 to 1. Also, Nine Health Fair can use help answering phones on April 17 and 18; location 11th and Delaware. We will also make Mother's Day baskets again, so start saving your small toiletry items. <u>Fundraising</u> – Diane Twining reported that \$800 was raised at the Amelia Earhart dinner, including sales of aprons and Zonta pin holders made by the Fundraising committee, and donations of items such as autographed professional sports items donated by Kate Linscott, and quite a few items such as jewelry from other club members.
