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#### MINUTES OF ZONTA CLUB OF DENVER

#### **GRANT AWARDS MEETING**

#### 2-8-2018, Rendezvous Restaurant, Aurora, CO

Members enjoyed a social hour at the restaurant. President Julie Bradley called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm, and everyone was invited to enjoy their dinner.

Carol Mangold, Advocacy Chairman, gave us an Advocacy Moment. She reminded us of two dates: February 15, Legislative day, 11:30 – 12:30 at the Capitol building; and February 27, Colorado Women's Legislative Breakfast, 7 am at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center, 1370 Grant St., Denver. Carol then reminded us of why women participate in protest marches. Historically we march because all of the freedoms modern day women enjoy have grown out of the protest marches.

Service Chairman, Mary Benoit, presided over the presentation of our service grants:

- 1. Nancy McWhirter and Debbie Gridley introduced Ashley Lewis from DVI who received a \$10,000 grant. DVI was founded in 1986 as a direct advocacy group for women. Over the years it evolved into DVI for Women with Disabilities which is its legal name. They advocate for all women and men and have created an organization to advocate for an abuse-free culture for all. Ashley said that the direction they are going is immediate intervention (getting victims into safe housing and then finding them permanent residences. They will use our money to guarantee their safety and deposits for permanent housing. They also provide cell phones.
- 2. Linda Rhea and Kathy Hyzer introduced Amy Livingston and Tara Malinkovich from the Global Health Foundation who received a \$9000 grant. Amy is the founder and oversees Family Planning & Reproductive Health. She said they are targeting the sexually active population. Tara coordinates with Denver Health in School Based Health Centers to provide all kinds of health care to kids who need it, including birth control and counseling. She said that the School Based centers have had a huge impact on low income population health care, including family planning.
- 3. CJ Long introduced Juliana Nelson, Executive Director of Friends of the Haven who received a \$7000 grant. Juliana said that their mission is to fund the Haven and Baby Haven and to advocate for the women and kids there. During a woman's stay at the Haven, they take a deep dive into the reasons for their substance abuse many have underlying mental health issues. She is proud of the fact that the babies born at baby Haven do not go into foster care. Our grant to them makes us part of the solution, (i.e. providing exercise for the women who need to learn and re-learn healthy lifestyles and how to enjoy life without substance abuse.) To that end, they are introduced to new cultural experiences such as ballet and theater.
- 4. Nikki Headlee and Lori DiSaia introduced Matria Ramos, Director and Theresa Mezza, volunteer coordinator for Hope House of Colorado who received a \$4500 grant. Matria said they began by providing shelter for teen moms. They require all teens to choose a form of contraception, and they urge them to get their GEDs. The goal is to empower teen moms to achieve self-sufficiency, to give them the confidence to succeed. They served 183 moms last year and the goal is to serve 200 this year. Our grant will help them pay for

GED fees, transportation, child care, meals for moms and kids, a graduation ceremony and college application help. Theresa said they have need of volunteers to help with tutoring, driving and at their early learning center.

5. Our club gave \$10,000 to ZI to fund one full Amelia Earhart Scholarship. And the remaining \$7,880 was divided between ZISVAW and ZI's current international projects.

President Julie then gave grant recipients the option of leaving while we have our business meeting and all of them opted to leave.

Minutes of the January meeting as taken by Mary Lou Edwards for Secretary Penny Burke were approved as read.

Treasurer Barbara Pellegren reported on the monies taken in for the Day of Film and on the progress of Pouch sales.

Membership Chairman, Elizabeth Savage, reported on a potential venue change as we have almost outgrown The Fresh Fish Company. The committee has researched alternatives and those will be forwarded via email to all members who are asked to vote for the one they want.

Mary Lou Edwards, Fundraising Chairman, reported on the progress of our Day of Film. We have gotten approximately \$5000 in sponsors to date along with approximately \$1000 in ticket sales and \$55 in donations. This takes us to about halfway of the money we budgeted to raise for this event, so everyone needs to concentrate on selling tickets/getting sponsors during the month of February while tickets are still \$45. Wendy said that the Curious Cork would not donate champagne this year, so we need to find another donor for that. Let Mary Lou know of any possibilities.

Julie Bradley updated us on ZI International Convention news. The hotel they posted is now full and the Japanese Zonta club in Yokohama is looking for another one for us. If you haven't registered and plan to go, you might want to make your reservations as soon as possible.

Evie Ashmore told us to watch for Dana Crawford's show on PBS tonight. We hosted the author of a book about Dana Crawford at one of our meetings last year.

Debbie Gridley won the 50/50 raffle.

Julie Bradley said our two birthday ladies were not at the meeting: Kate Linscott has been a member for 32 years and her birthday is February 14. Dawn Bali is a newer member and her birthday is February 18.

There being no further business before the club, the meeting was adjourned.

#### ADVOCACY WORKS

On Thursday February 15 Carol Mangold and I were fortunate to attend the Human Trafficking Day at the State Capitol. This event was organized by the Human Trafficking Task Force of Southern Colorado. That organization was founded 10 years ago by my dear friend and sister Zontian, Betty Edwards. Betty is a member of the Pikes Peak Area Zonta Club and a former District 12 governor. Back in the day, when this organization was founded, very few had ever heard of human trafficking and the ones that had heard of it were convinced that it only happened in far-away Asian countries and never touched the shores of the US. How shocked all of us were to find trafficking happening in our own backyards. That is a collective backyard of America including big cities, small towns, families, high schools and colleges. That shock still resonates as it is a crime so horrific and unbelievable that we still have problems wrapping our brains around it. Much to Betty's credit, instead of bemoaning what was happening, she chose to do something about it. She became passionate about human trafficking and started the organization. The rest is history.

The day at the capitol was titled "Surviving Trafficking". Ten years ago I'm not sure that title was anything any of us could have imagined. The day began with everyone invited to observe the State House and Senate in session. Everyone was encouraged to make appointments with their legislators and speak with them about the importance of stronger laws to prosecute the perpetrators of this crime and to advocate for the rehabilitation of the victims. There was a display by iEmpathize, the theme of which was "*The Apathy Effect Exhibit: Igniting Empathy to End Child Exploitation*. About noon there was a gathering in the west foyer. There was quite a crowd. We were welcomed by the chair of the event, Tamara Farah. Tamara introduced Governor John Hickenlooper. Governor Hickenlooper gave encouraging words of support for all the hard work and dedication. He also spoke about the future and his hopes that human trafficking will be eradicated. After that there were three brief panel discussions from law enforcement, legislators, and a survivor. It was all very informative and hopeful. As we learn more we grow stronger and more resolute. Coincidently, one week later on February 22<sup>nd</sup> the Colorado State University put on their first human trafficking symposium.

I remain amazed by the impact this movement has had in the last 10 years. It is a fact: advocacy works. I encourage all of you to feel your passion. Take your passion and turn it into action. We are so lucky to belong to an organization of like-minded individuals that have one purpose in mind, to improve the status of women. What a great guiding light when choosing meaning full action.

A woman is trying to overcome her drug addiction. With a child to care for it's nearly impossible to focus on fighting that disease. **The Haven** offers a space in a residential facility and Qualistar-rated childcare to accompany the evidence-based treatment to help her reclaim her health and confidence.

Vanessa first used alcohol at the tender age of 8. She dropped out of school in 10th grade and became a mom at age 16. Unfortunately these are common realities for young women growing up in generational poverty. At **Hope House**, she earned her GED and explored a variety of career options. One activity included a drive-along with an Arvada police officer. This experience completely changed Vanessa's perspective, and she now wants to become an attorney. Hope House's Learning Lab will give Vanessa practical support as she enrolls in college to pursue her dream.

Our grant to **The Initiative** helps women with disabilities recapture control of their lives after many kinds of abuse. Direct services help with immediate safety, self-sufficiency, victim counseling, and criminal justice support. Currently they serve victims of sexual assault, human trafficking, elder abuse, stalking, and caregiver abuse. They also help survivors develop self-care plans and refer to affordable housing opportunities, therapy, food and clothing banks, legal advocacy and assistance, domestic violence shelters, and more.

A woman finds a **Global Health Foundation** brochure at a health clinic that describes the *Just Talk About It* program. When she attends her first session, she finds other 18-29 year-old women who are open about what they know about sexual and reproductive health, and trained counselors to guide them in finding out more and becoming confident about protecting themselves.
