WOMEN OF COURAGE

Doshika Deo of Fiii was born and raised to make a difference. When she was a little girl, her father used to take her to the squatter settlements to raise awareness of inequality and the importance of giving back. As an adult, she has been a vocal advocate for Fiji's return to democracy and especially for the participation of women and young people in the democratization process. She was



one of the very first candidates in the country to announce her intention to stand in Fiji's 2014 elections, the first since a military coup in 2006.

Despite intense criticism, constant threats of rape and violence, and financial difficulties, Roshika and her Be the Change political campaign are inspiring a new generation of Fijian women and youth to believe in democracy and the power of civic participation. Roshika has also been one of Fiji's most outspoken critics of violence and discrimination against women and girls, and has publicly stood up for greater government accountability. And in her bold efforts to expand political participation among all Fijians, Roshika has refused to be silenced or intimidated. For her advocacy, for political reform in the name of democracy and human rights, and a country free of violence against women, the United States Department of State honored her with a Secretary of State's International Woman of Courage award.

APRIL MEETING MINUTES

President, Wendy Henry-Moraskie called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

Guests at the meeting: Mary Benoit introduced Tracy McDonough; Wendy Henry-Moraskie introduced Penny Burke.

Judy McNerny gave the IAM (Inspirational Advocacy Moment) about Equal Pay for Women (it's still \$.80 to the \$1.00 in Colorado).

The March Minutes were approved; Kathy Hyzer, Treasurer, asked everyone to get their dues in as soon as possible; and President Wendy invited everyone to participate in dinner.

PROGRAM:

Helen Mulhern introduced our speaker, Dr. Sheila Porter, from the Academy of Lifelong Learning. Dr. Porter has been to almost all the countries in Africa and believes that women are the future of Africa. She said that some of the factors in her belief apply to women in all third-world countries, with some differences. Africa has been seen as a hopeless barrel of aid and Aids - a black hole of development money. Dr. Doug Allen at DU, whose expertise is China, was born in Zimbabwe and agrees with her reasoning that education determines the eradication and modification of poverty. Her reasons for why women are the future in Africa include:

1. Women are the transmitters of culture. They pass down values and mores creating little pockets of change. Example in Rwanda after the conflict there when so many people were murdered, mostly men. As a result, 80% of the people in government were women and it has remained that way. An article in the NY Times talked about women forgiving their perpetrators in Rwanda in their quest for peace - witness the "Gotcha" trials that were held in front yards. Resolutions between victims and perpetrators were negotiated in many such trials, resulting in homes and lives being rebuilt.

Dr. Porter is studying why people hate. Praetoria, South Africa is a notably racist area (a Boer-Africans enclave), but after apartheid ended it has become another area of change. The recent Oscar Pistorius trial is being held there now, with a black woman as judge.

Women are less tolerant of corruption. A sign noted upon entering Botswana says "Botswana will tolerate no corruption" - there are three major tribes cooperating there for the sake of their country.

Women put a greater emphasis on peace than war - they think in terms of loss, unlike most men. In Zimbabwe, where Mugabe still rules, women are property and not able to refuse their families. They are powerless and have poor role models - women relatives often force FGM onto younger female relatives. Teachers are changing things there by teaching boys to respect women - education enables people to reject FGM. Mugabe was a Freedom Fighter when he was younger. They once fought for freedom from European rulers, but as they grew older they turned into terrorists. Mugabe went into decline after he married his second, very aggressive wife, but he is getting very old and will soon not be an influence in Zimbabwe.

In Mali women are tattooed and men are polygamists. Women are beginning to see different possibilities for their life. The country is embroiled in war right now and France recently stepped in to keep them from dissolving.

- 2. Microlending organizations like KIVA give women money to form small groups to do business, including forming banks to disburse loans. Microlending has been a huge boon to women's empowerment. A good book to read about sustainable agri-technogies is economist Dambisa Moyo's "Dead Aid: Why Aid is Not Working and Why There is a Better Way for Africa."
- 3. Women's values for peace will change the way boys are raised. Women are taking charge of rehabbing boys who were child soldiers.

Dr. Porter does evaluations for women seeking political asylum. She ended her talk by showing us a film called "Africa is a Woman's Name" about a school with a dynamic woman principal and lots of students who are learning respect for others and developing a love for schoolwork.

<u>ZI Convention lodging</u>: President Wendy has two condos near the Convention Center in Florida that will accommodate up to 10 people - if anyone needs lodging, give her a call.

<u>Committee Preferences</u>: President-Elect Mary Benoit asked that everyone note their committee preference for the new year on the printed forms she handed out. Mary also told everyone about Pam Harvey's Human Trafficking event on May 3, 9am - 3 pm, \$20 fee, at a church in SW Denver.

COMMITTEES:

<u>Fundraising</u>: Julie Bradley reported that the film event was a success and that the topic of the film spoke effectively to our mission - even though only 80 people showed up, we sold 122 tickets and made more money than last year. The next event will be the garage sale at Cynthia Herndon's home on May 17th. Everyone needs to commit to a time to help with organizing and pricing items on Friday, May 16th, and/or to sell items on Saturday, May 17th. Julie urged everyone to sign the sign-up sheets.

<u>Service</u>: Nikki Headlee, Kathy Hyzer, Helen Mulhern and Beth Mundell are in charge of the Delores House dinner on Easter Sunday and they will appreciate a couple more people volunteering to help them.

<u>ZIF</u>: Nikki Headlee reported our membership donated 100% to the Zonta International Foundation resulting in Pam Dumonceau's matching contribution of over \$700 - THANK YOU PAM!

DOMESTIC DIVA

Asparagus Pasta Salad

Here is an easy, delicious addition to a springtime brunch or as a light entree.

Ingredients

1 pound bowtie pasta
1 pound asparagus, ends trimmed
Olive oil, for drizzling
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 shallot, finely chopped
1 clove garlic, finely chopped
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
Zest and juice of 1/2 lemon
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
4 tablespoons olive oil
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
1/4 cup thinly sliced fresh chives
1 (4-ounce) container crumbled goat cheese

Directions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F.


Add pasta to a large pot of boiling salted water and cook until al dente. Drain in a colander and let cool.

Meanwhile, slice asparagus on the bias into 1/2-inch pieces. Place the asparagus on a sheet tray and drizzle with olive oil, and season with salt and pepper. Place in oven and roast for 10 minutes, until slightly tender. Remove and let cool.

In a small bowl, combine shallot, garlic, mustard, lemon zest, lemon juice, and red pepper flakes. Whisk in olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Add chives.

Add pasta and roasted asparagus to a large bowl. Drizzle with dressing and toss. Add the crumbled goat cheese, toss and serve.
