President Sheila's November Message...

As I look out the window of my home-office today, I see the big stack of logs from the cottonwood tree that I had cut down last week. It was both emotionally and financially expensive to cut it down. I had started the tree from an offshoot of a neighbor's tree about 12 years ago. I watched the tree change every season, and it had grown to around 20 feet tall. It provided shade, and was a good screen between our yard and the neighbor's yard. I tried to save the tree by having it trimmed once or twice a year, but it finally gave up for good a couple of months ago. The birds liked to sit in the top of it, and it was fun to watch them out of my kitchen window. I won't even tell you how much it cost to cut it down, but when I told the cost to Steve, my husband, he threatened to rent climbing spikes and the other paraphernalia they use and cut it down himself. Of course, I wouldn't let him do that as I had visions of him falling out of the tree with his chainsaw on (the Chainsaw Massacre - only on himself). The logs will be cut and used for firewood in my sister's wood stoves on her farm. I can't stand to throw wood away. I always think of the poor people around the world who have to walk for miles to find wood to burn for heat or for boiling water, so I try to recycle wood whenever possible.

My cottonwood tree sort of reminds me of the Zonta Annual Reports. They finally gave up the ghost after many years, but it was not a total loss - quarterly reports were developed from them. I'm sure some Zontians liked the annual reports (probably the women at International headquarters), and I suspect it was emotionally and financially expensive to throw the annual reporting function away, and to develop the new quarterly reporting process and forms. I'm sure they tried to save the annual reporting process, but I heard that only 25% of the clubs filed reports every year, so something had to be done. New quarterly report forms were sent to the club presidents in September, and I shared them with the Board in October. I will be asking the committee chairs to share them with their committees after the holidays. I personally like the quarterly reports MUCH better. Along with service hours we will be able to

report hours on fundraising, legislative awareness/advocacy, leadership training, international programs/projects, awards, UN, and fellowship. I will also report the number of current members, new members inducted, members resigned, and membership targets for each quarter. Robin Forti and I will be redesigning the service hour tracking sheets to include all of these activities very soon. In the meantime, please jot down the hours you spend planning and delivering the abovementioned items. Time spent in club meetings and committee meetings do not count however.

Along the lines of membership, service, and fellowship, I think it's time to remind everyone, (mostly myself) of my goals for this year and how we're doing on them. The first one was to significantly increase membership. We're doing that! We started out the Zonta year with 34 members and we will have 38 members by the end of December. We're well on our way to Net 7! My second goal was to do valuable service programs. We've stopped participating in service projects (Ronald McDonald) that don't fit our mission. We're beginning new ones (the Delores Project) that are a better fit for us. We have recently participated in the poverty simulation with Work Options for Women, and we will be hosting a cooking workshop and holiday party for the Teen Moms before the end of the year. My third goal was to have fun. I'm not sure how we're doing on that one, but if we're not having fun, let's start!!

There are many enjoyable and rewarding activities coming up this holiday season. Let's enjoy them all, and be thankful for our many blessings.



Advance Human Rights End Violence Against Women

Campaign Overview

Zonta International invites all Zonta Clubs, Zontians and friends of Zonta to join in the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence Campaign 2006 – 25 November through 10 December. Participants in this global campaign against gender violence have been instrumental in bringing issues of violence against women to the forefront in local, national, regional and global arenas since the first campaign originating from the first Women's Global Leadership Institute sponsored by the Center for Women's Global Leadership in 1991. The Campaign is an organizing strategy for individuals and groups around the world to call for the elimination of all forms of violence against women.

This year's campaign emphasizes the connections between violence against women and women's health and the detrimental consequences violence against women has on the well-being of the world as a whole. There is growing recognition that women and girls' risk of and vulnerability to HIV infection is shaped by deep-rooted and pervasive gender inequalities, in particular violence against them. For millions of women, the experience or fear of violence is a daily reality and increasingly, so is HIV/AIDS.

Prevalence of violence against women and girls*

Violence against women is a universal problem and one of the most widespread violations of human rights. One in three women will suffer some form of violence in her lifetime, becoming part of an epidemic that devastates lives, fractures communities, and stalls development.

In no country in the world are women safe from domestic and intimate violence. In Cambodia, 16 percent of women are physically abused by their husbands; in the UK 30 percent are physically abused by partners or ex partners; this is 52 percent in the West Bank; 21 percent in Nicaragua; 29 percent in Canada; and 22 percent in the US. Half of the women who die from homicides are killed by their current of former husbands or partners. Although a majority of countries now have legislation that addresses domestic violence, high levels of violence still persist. There is a need for greater focus on implementation and enforcement of legislation, and an end to laws that emphasize family reunification over the rights of women and girls.

In the US, 700,000 women are raped or sexually assaulted each year, with 14.8 percent of women reporting having been raped before the age of 17. In Peru, a study of 12 to 16 year old girls giving birth found that 90 percent of them were pregnant from rape, often incest.

Each year, roughly two million girls between the ages of 5 and 15 are trafficked, sold, or coerced into prostitution.

Prevalence of HIV/AIDS among women and girls*

Women's inability to negotiate safe sex and refuse unwanted sex is closely linked to the high prevalence of HIV/AIDS. For many women, the fear of violence prevents them from declaring their HIV-positive status and seeking help and treatment. Young women are particularly vulnerable to coerced sex and are increasingly being infected with HIV/AIDS. Over half of new HIV infections world-wide are occurring among young people between the ages of 15 to 24, and over 60 percent of HIV-positive youth between the ages of 15 and 24 are women.



Prevalence of violence against women and girls*

- In no country in the world are women safe from domestic and intimate violence.
- Domestic violence is the major cause of death and disability for **European women** ages 16 to 44, and accounts for more death and ill-health than cancer or traffic accidents.
- The **Russian** government estimates that 14,000 women were killed by relatives in 1999, yet the country still has no law specifically addressing domestic violence.
- In **South Africa,** more women are shot at home in acts of domestic violence than are shot by strangers on the streets or by intruders.
- In the **US**, a woman is raped every 6 minutes; a woman is battered every 15 seconds.
- This year, more than 15,000 women will be sold into sexual slavery in **China**.
- In **Bangladesh**, 200 women will be horribly disfigured when their spurned husbands or suitors burn them with acid.
- In **India**, more than 7,000 women will be murdered by their families and in-laws in disputes over dowries.

Prevalence of HIV/AIDS among women and girls*

- Today, half or more of the 40 million people infected with HIV in the world are women.
- Millions of those infected with HIV are young people aged 15-24 years who now account for half of all new infections.
- Over 60 percent of HIV-positive youth between 15 and 24 are women.

25 November – International Day Against Violence Against Women was declared in July 1981 in Bogota Colombia to commemorate the violent assassination of the Mirabal sisters (Patria, Minerva and Maria Teresa) on 25 November 1960 by the dictatorship of Rafael Trujillo in the Dominican Republic. In 1999, the United Nations officially recognized 25 November as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women.

1 December – World AIDS Day marks the beginning of an annual campaign to encourage public support for and development of programs to prevent the spread of HIV infection and promote awareness of issues surrounding HIV/AIDS. First observed in 1988, World AIDS Day serves to strengthen the global effort to face the challenges of the AIDS pandemic. This year, the theme of the UNAIDS World AIDS Campaign is "Stop AIDS. Keep the Promise," and demands governments keep their policy commitments related to HIV/AIDS.

10 December – International Human Rights Day marks the celebration of the 1948 adoption of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights.*

Zonta Club of Denver General Meeting Minutes October 12, 2006

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 by President Sheila Davis.

Invocation: Kathy Hyzer read the Zontian "A Collect For Club Women" from our directory.

Guests: Member Beth Mundell introduced her guests and the evening's speakers; Lt. Pat Woodin, Cadet Natalie Hernandez and Division Chief Patsy Mundell. Mary Benoit introduced Nancy Wong and Deborah Shriner and Kathy Hyzer introduced her guest Helga Weiss.

Status of Women: Member Nancy Long presented a brief program discussing the increasing numbers of women studying and participating in the 'hard sciences', such as math and engineering. She quoted Barbie (the doll) as saying, "Math is hard." Notable statistics reflect that 55% of fulltime and 70% of part time students are women with gains of 45% and 19% in math and engineering majors.

Program: Beth Mundell introduced Cadet Natalie Hernandez who spoke about her interests, what drew her towards law enforcement and her ultimate goal to be a crime laboratory manager. She ended with a statement that drives her to succeed. "Not only to dream but to expect."

Lt. Pat Woodin told of her evolution into law enforcement and progression through the ranks of Jefferson County and into the internal affairs (Quality Assurance) and defending officers as they perform their daily duties.

Finally Division Chief Pasty Mundell, the first female Chief in Jefferson County, spoke of her 21 years in law enforcement and the scope of her responsibilities. She noted that the police force has the "Right to take people's rights and freedoms away" and she spoke very strongly about how she's accountable for abiding by the mission, rules and guidelines of the position.

All of the speakers told of past instances of gender biases and how the situation is improving in their experiences.

Minutes: September Minutes approved as printed in the Smoke Signal.

Treasurer: Judy Allen distributed the printed financial reports to the membership.

Membership: Julie Bradley reported the attendance for the meeting was; 20 members and 6 guests. The Club's Open House at the King Foundation had 10 potential members in attendance and several other guests, notably guests from the King Foundation and Metropolitan State College. The Holiday Party will be held at the Brown Palace and will honor Bobbi Razee for 60 years of membership. The November general membership meeting is also honoring another long-term member. Members were encouraged to suggest new meeting locations and the committee members will research and report back with their findings.

Service: Robin distributed a list of the 2006-2007 Service Projects and verbally described the activities that are being planned. Motion made and carried to accept all of the Projects. (Imagination Library; Teen Moms; Delores Project; WOW; Women's Bean Project; Race for the Cure; Santa Claus Shop; and Bell Ringing for the Salvation Army)

Fund Raising: Judy Allen reported that the Macy Discount Tickets were not as successful as hoped; but Evie Ashmore announced that the Club was listed as participating in the project in promotional flyers distributed at the store. Annual Raffle Tickets were distributed (30 for each member) and everyone was reminded that members have to sell the tickets, not a 'designated' individual. Drawing for the prize will be completed at the Holiday Party. Potential Theater Events are being researched and will be announced soon.

New Business:

Sheila Davis very briefly announced the Club's attainment of the District 12 Service Award for the past year and will report in greater detail at the November meeting. Sheila also described the awarding of our Zontian of the Year/Edna Jean Hershey Award. Mary Benoit was honored for her many contributions to our Club, the Area, District and Internationally over the years and her continuing support of our Mission and goals. Evie Ashmore presented Mary with an engraved plaque and vase in honor of her accomplishments.

Sheila also awarded yellow rose pins in recognition of: exceptional and successful efforts made by Judy McNerny in organizing the Open House; and Diane Twining's activities at the Area 3 BBQ reviewing the Australian International Convention.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:55.
