NOVEMBER, 2014 Human Trafficking Symposium

On Saturday October 25th I had the honor and privilege of attending the 7th annual Human Trafficking Symposium sponsored by The Southern Colorado Human Trafficking Task Force. The Task Force was started about eight years ago by Betty Edwards (in photo). Betty is a member of the Pikes Peak Zonta Club and a past District 12 Governor. One of her first goals



was to put on a symposium to raise awareness about human trafficking in the community. That symposium was held at Youth with a Mission in Colorado Springs with about 120 attendees, impressive for a first try. Every symposium since then has been held at YWAM until this year. The symposium on Oct. 25 was held at University of Colorado-Colorado Springs campus. There were 450 registered and it was amazing.

WOW!! It was so amazing. I will give you some of my thoughts, observations and tidbits.

The first speaker was Dr. Thomas Krannawitter. He was amazed at the size of the audience on such a beautiful day. He feels that defeating trafficking in the US is possible because we are the only nation in the world that has ever stood on the ground of equality. The signers and authors of the Constitution had great difficulties with slavery and of course it didn't end there. An astounding amount of lives were lost over slavery in the Civil War. Nowhere in the world has such a loss of life happened over this issue.

What was learned about young girls that are trafficked and "in the life" were enough to break one's heart. Nationally the average age of trafficked youth is 11, in Colorado it is between 13 and 14. The most vulnerable are runaways. Once a youth has run away more than four times they are ear marked to be vulnerable to be trafficked and watched closely by law enforcement. The perpetrators often tattoo their victims so they have more trouble escaping and are easily identified within that social circle. A film showing a pimp being interviewed said it was the best job he ever had, making a lot of money selling young girls not just once but many times in one day. Why deal drugs, it is too dangerous, all those weapons and the troublesome law enforcement.

At the Air Force Academy there is a club of about 100 cadets learning about trafficking. We heard from two cadets about their work. They partner with local high schools to spread the word about trafficking. And of course when they graduate from the Academy they will be scattered around the world with a working knowledge of trafficking.

There are a lot of dollars raised for the battle against trafficking. Some wonder why the lion's share is spent in the US when there is a better bang for the buck off shore. The reason: we have the best laws and the best law enforcement.

We are faced with a huge dilemma. There is one bed in a safe house, shelter, etc. for every 100 victims and at that rate we will NEVER catch up. Of course we should continue to offer shelter and services to victims but we need pursue other solutions. We need to focus on demand. Trafficking needs to stop before it starts. There is a push for advertisements and billboards. Hopefully soon we will begin to see billboards on buses, posters in airports, rest stops, and maybe at a street corner near you. Over 80% of Americans don't know anything about human trafficking. This campaign should raise awareness. It might be a dream that within the decade the demand will slow down, but it is a hopeful dream.

ESSIE GARRETT

Sheila Davis and I were privileged to attend the memorial service for Essie Garret held at the Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library on September 27. Essie was a member of our club for a brief period from 2007-2009. She is best known as an ultra marathoner. Each year she would pick a cause and run for it. They weren't just marathons that she ran. She ran over 25,000 miles since 1981 and raised in excess of one million dollars for non-profit charities. She was the first black ultra marathoner in the world.



In 2008 Essie pushed and pulled a flight simulator from Amelia Earhart's home in Atchison, Kansas, to the Flight Training Center at the Front Range Airport in Watkins, CO. This event took place on the 100 year anniversary of the last transmission from Earhart. Essie chose the end point because there were a significant number of women learning to fly at the Flight Training Center. The Zonta Club of Denver gave a send-off party for her at the Interstate Diner in Watkins.

Other highlights of Essie's life included being inducted into the Colorado Sportwomen's Hall of Fame in 1993 and being an Olympic torch bearer for the State of Colorado in 1996. In addition, in honor of Black History Month in 1998, she ran 75 miles from Dearfield, Colorado (an early black town and farming community in eastern Colorado) to Emily Griffith Opportunity School.

Essie's heart belonged to the Emily Griffin Opportunity School where she taught for many, many years. She was a champion of women working in non-traditional settings. She said, "We need women in engineering, mathematics, and technological fields."

She eschewed worldly goods but was always ready to share what she had with others. She not only talked the talk but she walked the walk. While she is best known for being an ultra marathoner, those who knew her best said she was a true humanitarian in every sense of the word.






COMMITTEE REPORTS

Lobbyists can get more done with researching issues. When she ran for office, her mother said, "I hope you don't work with any lobbyists." One of the bills she wanted to get passed was to make the government buildings more energy efficient, so she worked with lobbyists who did all the research. Advocacy is straight lobbying.
