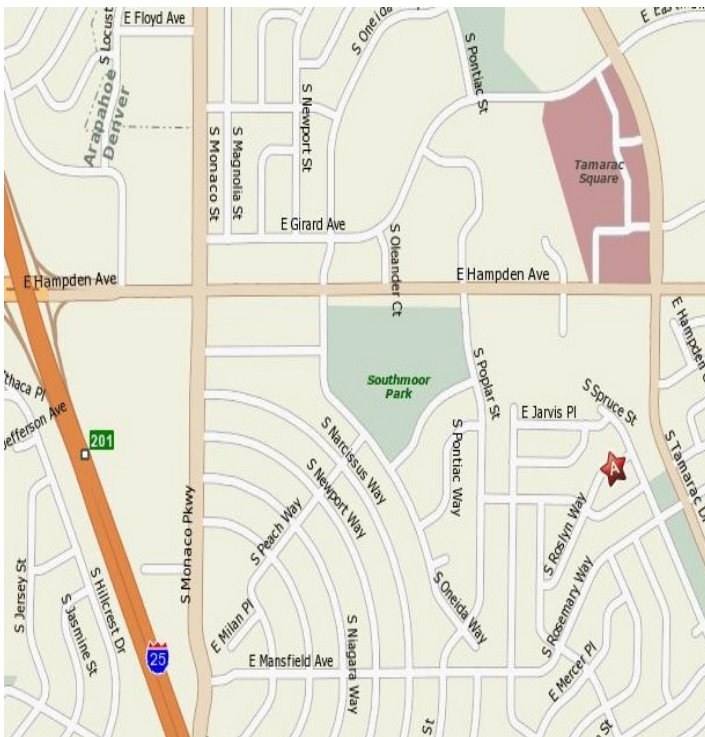
Member news—

President's Message

Dear Governors, International Committee Chairmen, Foundation Ambassadors, Past International Presidents, all Zontians,

Please find below some very helpful information in our continued efforts to fund our promises to women who do need our support NOW!

Co-branding Zonta International / UNICEF partnership

UNICEF has produced an excellent DVD called *Missing Mothers*. As the message may very well not only be related to women that will die during pregnancy or childbirth but also to our service project in Rwanda, where deaths of HIV positive mothers have created a wave of orphans.

We are grateful to UNICEF for allowing co-branding with Zonta of this production that will increase the understanding and importance of funding to the international service projects we have promised to support.

Although this DVD is produced by UNICEF and we do relate it to our Rwanda project, the message and statistics of *Missing Mothers* are as relevant for our service project in Liberia together with UNFPA. Prevention of obstetric fistula is not only repair and reduction through surgery, it is a matter of changing attitudes relating to the underlying reasons such as girl marriage (resulting in too young girls being pregnant) and the practice of FGM (female genital mutilation).

16 DAYS of activism against gender violence

NOVEMBER 25 - DECEMBER 10

2009 Campaign Theme

Commit • Act • Demand: We CAN End Violence Against Women!

Each year since 1991, tens of thousands of activists from every region of the world have taken part in the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence Campaign. The campaign's central messages—women's rights are human rights and violence against women constitutes a violation of human rights—have been a rallying call of the women's movement. Recognizing that violence against women affects people from every country, race, class, culture, and religion, the 16 Days Campaign provides an opportunity for activists to work together in solidarity and draw upon this period of heightened international attention to gain support for their local efforts.

The 2009 theme is: Commit ▪ Act ▪ Demand: We CAN End Violence Against Women!

Commit: We are All Responsible

In 1991 when 23 women from around the world met together at the first Women's Global Leadership Institute at the Center for Women's Global Leadership and envisioned the 16 Days Campaign, it was unlikely that any of them could have foreseen the incredible success of the campaign as a mobilizing tool. Because of their efforts and the commitment of so many other activists over the past 19 years, well over 2,000 organizations in 158 countries have organized around the 16 Days Campaign, and the issue of gender-based violence has received a significant amount of international attention. We all have a responsibility to end gender-based violence together as women, girls, men, boys, and individuals of all generations, religions, occupations, sexual orientations, abilities, political persuasions, and socio-economic backgrounds.

Act: We Can All Make a Difference

2009 will mark the 10th anniversary of the United Nations' formal recognition of November 25th as International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. There are many other landmark dates and documents that are the direct result of ACTION that women's rights activists and defenders have taken. The anti-violence against women movement provides one of the best illustrations of how local activism can translate into global action. Every action, no matter how big or small, can make a difference!

Demand: We Are All Accountable

At the Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing in 1995, women's organizations from around the world met with government representatives and collaboratively produced the Beijing Platform for Action—one of the most forward-thinking government negotiated documents on women's rights to date. This ground-breaking document set forth a list of actions, which, if implemented, would significantly reduce incidences of violence against women. 2010 marks the 15th anniversary of the Beijing Conference on Women. Therefore, we must all demand implementation of the Beijing Platform for Action, as well as other key documents, and demand state accountability for ending impunity, allocating adequate resources, and implementing good laws and national action plans to address violence against women (VAW). We also call on the UN to take bolder action on the UN Secretary-General's "UNiTE to End VAW" Campaign Framework for Action. We are all accountable for playing our part in reducing violence at the individual and community levels, as well as at the nation-state and global levels.

The 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence is an international campaign originating from the first Women's Global Leadership Institute sponsored by the Center for Women's Global Leadership (CWGL) at Rutgers University in 1991. Participants chose the dates, November 25, International Day Against Violence Against Women, and December 10, International Human Rights Day, in order to symbolically link violence against women and human rights and to emphasize that such violence is a human rights violation.

In the Zonta Club of Denver, we will be celebrating the 16 days of activism with articles in the *Smoke Signal* and daily emails during those specific 16 days—reminding everyone to Commit, Act and Demand accountability around the world for women and human rights.

Until further notice your Service Committee is collecting beverages for The Delores Project at club meetings. What that means is coffee, tea, hot chocolate or any other dry drink mixes. So as you shop, clip coupons or just generally feel like making the lives of the women at Delores better please purchase some beverages. You may also bring the beverages when you come to serve dinner.

When I spoke to you at the club meeting a few weeks ago I talked about the other needs of the women at The Delores Project and, as promised, here is the list.

Ongoing needs, the stuff there is never enough of:

Liquid hand soap (gallon size preferred)
 Disposable gloves (latex medical

and food service)
 Multipurpose cleaner, bleach (gallon refill size preferred)
 Trash bags (all sizes)
 Household items, new or used
 Coffee cups
 Silverware, serving utensils
 Brooms, dust pans, vacuums
 Bath towels, wash cloths
 Blankets, quilts (twin size preferred)
 Pillows, pillowcases (standard size preferred)
 Water pitchers (plastic preferred)

They are very picky about the clothes they accept, because their storage space is limited. They can always use:

New underwear
 New T-shirts (including promotional t-shirts from an event)
 New sweat pants and shirts
 New socks

Here are the long term items needed:

Mattress covers, twin bed, vinyl
 Pillow covers, vinyl
 Professional restaurant type carafes

Bus tubs for dirty dishes
 Chairs for dining room
 Sleep mats, cots, blow up mattresses for overflow clients
 Rubbermaid style bins for clients' belongings
 Shower curtains, narrow, industrial, locker-room style
 Single beds, metal
 Laundry cart with sides

ADVOCACY / UNITED NATIONS

UNITED NATIONS STEPS UP WOMEN-FOCUSED EFFORTS

The week of September 21, 2009, saw the U.N. General Assembly adopt a resolution to create a more potent women's agency: a single U.N. body to promote the advancement of women around the world.

By merging the four existing U.N. offices that deal with women's affairs, headed by an under-secretary-general (the third highest ranking position within the U.N), the effort is a bold move to put women's issues front and center on the international stage.

Is this then another step in recognizing the global plight of women? Is the United Nations once again becoming the venue to restore our humanitarian efforts? And what, if any, is the role of ZONTA, in moving the agenda forward?

As your new U.N. Chair and as part of our Advocacy Committee, I say Zonta can and should be part of the movement to erase the tragedy of our Sisters around the globe.



Women's rights are human rights. Just look carefully at what ZI has put in place for Biennial Goals: "support the programs and advocacy of the UN for the advancement of women," the CEDAW resolution, "use the

Commission on the Status of Women recommendations."

Notice also that directly under the United Nations goals in our directory Legislative Awareness and Advocacy are listed. They are linked!

Our job is to move these agendas forward, but I cannot do it alone. I must have your support.

Let's stir the pot and see what actions we can take over the next year. Let's set some strategy, let's plan an agenda, let's wipe out the misery of our sisters around the globe!

As Nicholas Kristof maintains in a recent *New York Times* article... "Women are not the problem...they are the solution."

The flag of the United Nations was adopted on October 20, 1947, and consists of the official emblem of the United Nations in white on a blue background. The emblem's design is a map of the world centered on the North Pole, in a wreath of olive branches. The blue color that appears in the background of the insignia was chosen to be "the opposite of red, the war color."

On September 30, led by Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, the U.N. Security Council approved a resolution to specifically mandate peacekeeping missions to protect women and children from rampant sexual violence during armed conflict. Clinton said, "The dehumanizing nature of sexual violence doesn't just harm a single individual or a single family or even

a single village or a single group, it shreds the fabric that weaves us together as human beings." Provisions of the resolution include the strengthening of monitoring and reporting on sexual violence, the retraining of peacekeepers, national forces and police, and calls to boost the participation of women in peacebuilding and other post-conflict processes.
