Autymn grew up in a rural town north of Denver with her family living just above the poverty line. Early in her life her vision of what was possible for her was narrow considering her limited socioeconomic potential. That changed in junior high school when on special teacher arranged an opportunity for her to participate in a six- week long summer program in Trinidad, Colorado called Upward Bound Math Science. She met young intelligent students from all over Colorado who were excited about their futures. That summer transformed her view of education and gave her a new strength in realizing her possibilities.

After high school graduation, Autymn worked for several commercial construction companies, including The Weitz Company, where she was paired with outstanding managers who recognized her talent and potential. She worked her way into project management. Because of her youth and gender she was sometimes not taken seriously on large-scale construction projects. She added a pink hardhat to her wardrobe to help bridge the gender gap. She also learned a powerful lesson in leadership - levity is often as important as strength when working with people.

Autymn will graduate in December 2014 with her Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration and is eager to experience different cultures and perspectives. She also wants the opportunity to help future generations of women navigate the field of project management in business by paying forward the mentorship and leadership that was given to her.

Following the establishment of the Federal Government in 1789 the intellectual and religious establishment assigned American women a new role as the moral upholders of the Union. Women should confine themselves to being the nurturers, educators and moral compass of a nation of superior male citizens.

"Public women" were not "good women."

The first impetus for change came from the pioneers for higher education for women.

One such woman was Emma Hart Willard (1787-8170) who recognized

women's intellectual deprivation following her marriage to a doctor. She succeeded in reforming the curriculum for young women destined for marriage and motherhood by asserting that a classical and scientific education would provide better role models.

She opened her Troy Female Seminary in 1814 when the Troy, New York, Common Council offered to raise money to establish a girls' school. In addition to the approved instruction in the social graces, Willard's curriculum emphasized such "unwomanly" subjects as zoology, anatomy, geometry and trigonometry. By 1831 the school had over 100 boarding students and over 200 day students. Much to the surprise of everyone, the school was profitable and also made money on the textbooks she wrote, particularly on such subjects as geography and history.

On her death, the Troy Female Seminary was renamed the Emma Willard School. It remains in operation today.

OPEN DOOR MINISTRIES REPORT

Dear members of the Zonta Club of Denver,

I wanted to share with you a report of joyful events that are happening at Open Door Ministries. The donation from Zonta Club of Denver has benefited the women in our Still Waters Housing program in impactful ways. Through this grant they have been able to pay for tuition, books, childcare and rent.



Still Waters Housing is made up of three homes that sit side-by-side on a Denver city block largely owned by Open Door Ministries.

Chayah House is a home for single women who are homeless due to various setbacks, such as imprisonment, drug or alcohol abuse, physical abuse and mental illness. It can house six women at a time.

Esther House is a transitional home for women, primarily targeting those leaving the sex-trade industry, addictions and other destructive lifestyles. It can house five women at a time.

Treasure House is a home for at-risk single mothers and their children. They typically come from backgrounds that include drug or alcohol abuse, physical abuse, sexual abuse, mental illness and broken families. Residents can be as young as 16 years old. There are beds for four women and up to six children.

Last year I shared the story of Zoe and LaShonda who were a part of our Treasure House. They have both since graduated, obtained employment, and live in stable housing. Zoe has continued to pursue education in event planning and stays connected to the Open Door Ministries community.

This year I would like to share Casey's story. Casey came to Chayah House to recover from a life of homelessness, alcoholism, and despair. Her battle with alcohol led her to spend five months

sleeping on 16th street mall, just a block away from where she had been a successful oil and gas accountant. While going through the Still Waters Housing program Casey utilized the Zonta Club funds to become certified in QuickBooks to help advance her career in accounting. She has conquered her alcoholism, graduated from the program and has also received a job in H&R Block. She has developed relationships in our community and continues to be an active member.

Another lady named Holly, a year-long resident in Esther House, has been attending cosmetology school to become a hairstylist. Holly has been around the Open Door Ministries community for several years struggling to overcome her addictions with different programs. After all these years we continue to show her love and support, welcoming her back to the community with open arms to help her. This time at Esther House has been the longest she has stayed in a single program and the most determined to change her life.

The grant from Zonta Club is changing lives on our Open Door Ministries block. These women are succeeding and creating better lives for themselves and their children. We cannot thank you enough for your contribution.

Program

Claire Levy will be the October meeting speaker.

The Colorado Center on Law and Policy (CCLP) is an advocacy organization dedicated to promoting justice, economic security, access to health care and sound fiscal policies. Its mission is to advance the health, economic security and wellbeing of low-income Coloradans through research, education, advocacy and litigation.



Claire Levy served seven years in the Colorado House of Representatives before being selected by CCLP's board of directors to serve as executive director.

Prior to serving in the General Assembly Claire had a varied legal career that included a stint in the Appellate Division of the Colorado Public Defender's Office. In that role she represented indigent

people on appeal who had been convicted of serious felonies. Her job was to protect the constitutional rights of people accused of felonies, and assure that anyone convicted of a felony had received a fair trial, regardless of their income. Before running for office, Levy focused on land use law with an emphasis on affordable housing and urban development.

In the Colorado House, Levy most recently served as the vice-chair of the Joint Budget Committee and chair of the House Committee on Appropriations, where she oversaw the appropriations for many of the public benefits programs on behalf of which CCLP advocates.

Claire will speak about the CCLP and about advocacy in general.

SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES

This meeting was called to order by President, Mary Benoit at 6:00 pm, after those present enjoyed cocktails and ordered their dinners. Guests were introduced: Linda Rhea introduced Micki Corwin-Dampick; Marian Lee introduced Liz Stewart, a lawyer; Mary Benoit introduced Abbie Kize and Bonnie Kize who works at Mathias Lock and Key; Jeannette Newville introduced our Jane M. Klausman Scholarship winner, Autymn DeWolfe and her boyfriend, John; Nancy McWhirter introduced our speaker, Sterling Harris, from COVA, along with Linda Harlin, and Debbie Gridley. Stephanie Sanders, from the SOUL Foundation, also visited the meeting.

Judy McNerny gave the Advocacy Moment. She talked about the pay gap between women & men. AAUW did a study through 2009 called "Graduating to a Pay Gap" which looked at women one year out of college working fulltime and found that they made 82% of the money their male counterparts were making - 7% less. The study suggested that one cause might be discrimination and that one gender difference is the willingness to negotiate their salary. Nikki Headlee added that as stated in the Smoke Signal, the lifetime loss of salary for women is \$1.2 million.

The August, 2014 Minutes were approved.

There was no treasurer's report.

Wendy Henry-Moraskie told us about a musical opportunity at the Posner Center on October 30. It will be an Anniversary Gala of the Symphony Chorus and Wendy can get us reduced rates on tickets - we need to sign the sheet and Kathy Hyzer and Judy McNerny will contact us further about the tickets.

President Mary talked about "Zonta Says No" this year which will also be held at the Posner Center on November 8, 2014. She asked that we take flyers and post them wherever people who might be interested in attending will see them.

Mary called our attention to the Denver Women's Commission meeting on October 29 which will be a round table discussion.

Linda Rhea told us about an Arc Thrift Store Fashion Show at the Doubletree Hilton in Westminster on 9-26-14 which will benefit GED. The cost is \$25 or \$35 at the door. Former First Lady of Colorado Frances Owens will be there.

Nancy McWhirter thanked everyone for bringing toothbrushes, toothpaste, combs, brushes and tampons for residents of COVA, and introduced Sterling Harris, Deputy Executive Director of COVA as our speaker for the evening. Sterling told us she is a childhood survivor of sexual violence which led her to her career. She told us COVA stories. COVA was founded in 1982 by volunteers. They had 501 members by 1986. Their Executive Director for the last 20 years is Nancy Lewis. Last October (2013) they put on the largest Victim's Services Conference in the U.S. They now have 8 staff members and 75 volunteers, between 700 & 800 members, and have many victim's advocates all over the justice system.

COVA's goal is to train leaders and advocate for victim's rights. They watch the laws and the advocates for sexual offender's rights. Colorado Victims for Justice is a club formed to change public policy.

They have a paid internship program (which stresses diversity leadership) for people from marginalized communities. 30-50% of these interns are eventually hired by COVA.

COVA's "Filling in the Gap" policy helps during national disasters or tragedies. This is where some of ZCD's grant money went this year. An example was when they helped with the Four Mile Canyon fire - they helped to appropriately respond. ZCD's grant also helps with their Crime Victims Emergency Fund which replaces lost income, fixes doors, broken windows, travel costs, phone and utility bills and legal papers. Our donations also helped with the Human Sex Trafficking Program - in place since 2008. They served 17 people in the 1^{st} 5 months of $2014 - \frac{1}{2}$ of their clients are male, predominately foreign laborers. They are partners in putting on a Human Trafficking conference on November 25 at Metro State.

Jeannette Newville then introduced our Jane M. Klausman Scholarship winner, Autymn DeWolfe from Loch Buie, CO. She is a Senior in Business Administration at Regis. She worked in various project management capacities in construction companies, but hit the glass ceiling so she went back to school. She feels that she has finally gotten to a place where she is not operating out of fear or lack of opportunities and she thanked us for our \$1,500 scholarship.

President Mary thanked Judy McNerny for our new Directories.

Committee Reports:

<u>Public Relations</u> - Katie Boysen wants to encourage members to use social media such as Meet-Up. We can RSVP for meetings there, guests too.

<u>Advocacy</u> - Judy McNerny had 2 sign-up sheets, one for giving the Advocacy Moments at meetings and one for attending Denver Women's Commission meetings the 1st Wednesday of every month. Their goals are on the city website.

Wendy Henry-Moraskie said that a recent Metro Scholar, Janine Jeffries, is involved with a 9-5 women's group with a dinner website.

<u>Membership</u> - Marian Lee said the committee is off to a great start: Dorothy Swindt is taking care of correspondence and Nikki Headlee is doing orientations. We have 3 new members and 1 new application.

<u>Service</u> - Nancy McWhirter said we are short a few people on the Delores Dinners sign up - they need 2 more people to help with Sunday, Sept. 21 - 2 people immediately signed up to help. Service Grant applications are due this coming Saturday (Sept.13, 2014). COVA has an Oct. 15 project; Open Door Ministries wants another reading activity this year and our Christmas party will be at The Haven again this year, December 11.

<u>Fundraising</u> - Gwen Fornia - she and Nikki are meeting with Tammy (the film theater manager) soon. We will have to pay for outside caterers this year as they now have a caterer there. The committee is looking at two good film possibilities. One is set in Nepal - "Untouchables: Children of God" is about sex trafficking and domestic violence. The other is JHOLA which is set in India and Nepal and is about Suttee, a practice of burning young wives along with their dead husbands which is still practiced in those countries. Evie Ashmore saw it at the ZI Convention and recommended it highly. Sponsorships are a minimum of \$300 - we need to start finding those NOW.

President Mary presented items that members need to vote on:

- 1. A \$50 donation to the Hershey Fund at Metro State in Marjorie Pickett's honor. This money will come out of our operating fund. Members can add to that donation if they get it to Kathy Hyzer by Sept. 18. Mary Benoit moved to make that donation and Nikki Headlee seconded the motion which was passed by all members present.
- 2. A \$50 donation in honor of Essie Garrett to the Blair Caldwell Library. Essie was a member of our club. She was a runner and a selfless, tireless worker at Emily Griffith. There will be a memorial celebration at Blair Caldwell Library on Sept. 26. Mary Benoit moved to make this donation and Sheila Davis seconded the motion which was passed by all members present.

Mary spoke about this year's Zonta Says No to Violence Against Women Art Event to be held on November 8 at the Posner Center and asked that we all please promote this event. Empty shoes representing victims of DV will be featured again - the red shoes for women who died. The tickets are \$25 and we will need to advertise and help at the event itself which will feature an art exhibit and sale. It will also have an educational component. All Area 3 clubs in the Denver area are collaborating on this event - it is a good way for Zonta to brand itself in Denver. Past ZI President, Lynn McKenzie thought up ZSN and got involved with UN Women. The color for ZSN is orange which we can wear every 3rd Thursday as a reminder of ZSN and in memory.

Sterling Harris drew a ticket for our 50-50 drawing, and Marian Lee gave the Zonta Rock to Alexis Newton who "rocks!"

Here is a simple Oktoberfest Recipe to cook up for dinner this month
