# From abused wife to independence

Jasmine is a courageous woman.
Last October, just a mere 10 months ago, with only \$200 in her pocket,
Jasmine took her four children and left an abusive husband. Jasmine has never had a job outside her home. She was married at 14 and had her first child at 15. During the time she was married, Jasmine was a stay at home mother. After

staying in various shelters and seeking different kinds of assistance, Jasmine eventually found her way to the Work Options for Women culinary training program.

Participating in WOW changed Jasmine's life. WOW helped Jasmine with childcare, housing, furniture, and even in helping register her kids for school. Jasmine started WOW in April and has just successfully completed all phases of the 12 week program. Through working with WOW's career center, Jasmine was supported in learning how to write a resume and in developing interviewing skills. Jasmine is now actively seeking a job.

Jasmine's beautiful smile and positive attitude are inspiring. Her ultimate dream is to be a chef, have her own food truck, and serve Latin and Caribbean food.

Meeting Jasmine was a pleasure. After our interview, Jasmine gave me a tour of the WOW facility. I now have a much better understanding of the WOW program and am glad our Zonta Club has been able to help women like Jasmine through our support of WOW.

# MORE NEWS FROM NORTH AMERICAN SUMMIT



Check out this picture - some remarkable Zontians!

While we were at the North American Summit we were lucky and very fortunate to take a Zonta History Tour. It was very inspiring.

The photo shows some Zontians you will recognize,

some not so much. The young woman in the long black skirt was our tour guide for the Forest Lawn Cemetery.

The Forest Lawn Cemetery is a beautiful grand old cemetery founded in 1849. This is where one of the most famous Zontians, Marion DeForest, is laid to rest. There are a lot of other notables buried there. The most recognizable is President Millard Fillmore, who insisted he have a modest burial and burial site.

As the tour continued I thought a lot about the remarkable Marion DeForest. In my reading I discovered how diverse and remarkable she truly was. She was many things to many people. We know and love her because she is one of our founding mothers, but Zonta was just one aspect of her life. She was a philanthropist, a playwright, a newspaper editor and a lot more. She was a public speaker on radio. She took advantage of the technology of her time in other ways. In 1928, when publicity for her play *Mr. Man* was slow, she and Zonta members hired a plane to distribute promotional leaflets over Western New York.

On the tour we also visited the Statler Hotel, where it all began. The very first Zonta meeting was held there and the Buffalo Club continued to meet there until it was converted to an office building. Although the hotel has seen better days, it is easy to see and imagine how wonderfully elegant a place it was. It is difficult to see it in decline but work is being done to restore it.

Then we visited "The Spirit of Womanhood" Oh, it was the spirit all right! We had to park close to a mile away, cross a very busy street and tromp through high grass and weeds to get to it. As with so much art, people's opinions varied and there was a lot of controversy surrounding this statue, thus its remote placement. I have an article about Marion DeForest and "The Spirit of Womanhood" which I will ask Judy to put it in the next *Smoke Signal*. It is a great ongoing story.

# Women's Participation in Peace Process Still Small

In 2000 the UN Security Council adopted Resolution 1325 calling for member states to ensure the inclusion of women in the process of preventing and resolving conflict.

In December 2011, President Barack Obama released the first ever U.S. National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security (NAP) as an Executive Order. The plan opens with the following powerful statement:

The goal of this National Action Plan on Women, Peace, and Security is as simple as it is profound: to empower half the world's population as equal partners in preventing conflict and building peace in countries threatened and affected by war, violence, and insecurity. Achieving this goal is critical to our national and global security.

We know that an Executive Order can be overturned by a new President (just as an Executive Order in Colorado can be over turned by a new Governor, which is one of the reasons I did not pursue re-creating the Commission on the Status of Women in Colorado.)

On July 31, 2013 the Women, Peace, and Security Act 2013 (H.R. 2874) was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Rep. Jan Schakowsky and 11 co-sponsors. This Act, if passed into law, will ensure that the United States continues to promote "women's meaningful inclusion and participation in mediation and negotiation processes...to prevent, mitigate, and resolve violent conflict and implements the United States National Action Plan on Women, Peace, and Security." The full text of the Act is at

On a daily basis women and children live in fear of violence and abuse. Women must be on the front lines, not only as victims but also as change agents.

It is incumbent upon us the women of Zonta and other women around the U.S. to make sure that the Women, Peace and Security Act of 2013 has the necessary sponsors sign on to this legislation. Please contact your Congressperson and inform them about this most needed legislation and to sign on as a co-sponsor.

As Advocacy Chair for Zonta Denver, let me say this: I do not care if you are a Republican or Democrat. This is an issue that should and must be addressed by both sides of the aisle.

# **Speaker**


Karen Sugar, Founder and Director of Women's Global Empowerment Fund, graduated with a Master's degree from the University of Colorado in 2008. Her studies focused on gender and development concentrating on the concept of microfinance and its potential to alleviate poverty. Sugar created the Credit Plus model which offers a unique and transformative microfinance and social capital building program, including a focus on leadership development.

She founded WGEF in April 2007, believing in the transformative power of MF and the critical need of women in northern Uganda for economic, social and political opportunities. # **Camille Shortridge Is ZCD 2013 Recipient**



Camille Shortridge just completed her third year of study in Business Administration / International Business at the University of Denver Daniel's College of Business. Camille resides in Denver and is a citizen of the U.S. and France. Camille's academic goal is to graduate from DU with a degree concentrating in

international business. Following graduation her goal is to live and work abroad with an international organization that aims to connect developed and less developed nations through business transactions. As a woman striving to work in the international business industry, Camille plans to use her abilities to influence and create the change that is needed in the international community in order to help less developed countries reach a higher global standard.

During the summer of 2013 Camille gained additional international experience by participating in the University of Denver's competitive Bosnia and Herzegovina "Moving Forward" International Service Learning Program. The program took her to Sarajevo for two months as an intern for an international non-profit that works with global business standards and solutions. Given that Bosnia and Herzegovina's economy is still hindered

from the Bosnian War of 1992, this is a project that will help further develop their economic system and the opportunities for its citizens.

Camille currently pays for her own education at DU by working part time during school, plus income from scholarships and loans. A faculty recommendation for Camille describes her as "exceptionally bright, seriously compassionate and thoroughly professional." Her work supervisor at DU's Student Life Center describes her as having "outstanding and exemplary personal character, commitment and positive attitude," in addition to providing excellent customer service and rapport with customers and co-workers. Camille has also dedicated much of her co-curricular time helping others by volunteering in the community for Habitat for Humanity, Invisible Children, Food Bank of the Rockies, The Delores Project, Junior Achievement and others. She is fluent in French and English.

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# **DOMESTIC DIVA**

# **Chicken Bites with Honey Mustard**

1 - 1/2 cup milk

2 eggs

1 T salt

3 lb boneless, skinless chicken breast cut into bite size pieces

2 - 1/2 cup flour

1/4 cup powdered sugar

4 t salt

1T pepper

oil for frying

# Honey mustard:

1/2 cup mayonnaise

2 T yellow prepared mustard

1/4 t garlic powder

1 T vinegar

1 T honey

dash of paprika

In a bowl, mix milk, eggs, and 1 T of salt - add chicken pieces and cover

Marinate at least 4 hours, but better if overnight.

In another bowl, mix flour, powdered sugar, 4 t salt and 1 T pepper. Add some chicken pieces to a large zip lock bag, add some flour mixture and shake to coat. Fry in batches at 375 degrees in a deep fryer or large Dutch oven. It only takes 3 or 4 minutes. Drain on paper towels or wire rack.

For honey mustard sauce, mix the mayonnaise, mustard, garlic powder, vinegar, honey and paprika in a small bowl, cover and refrigerate. Make ahead so it has a chance to blend together.

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# IN MEMORIAM

# Marjorie Nell Pickett

Long-time club member and past District governor, Marjorie Pickett died in August. The following remembrance was written by her great niece Donna with input from other family members. Her family and Zontians who knew Marjorie will long remember and miss her.

Many of us have dreamed at some point in our lives of running away to join the circus. Well, Aunt Marjorie did that. She enjoyed telling the story of being bitten by the circus monkey and being sent home. That was the first other efforts to lead her own life and be her own person. She spent much of her life doing the unconventional and unexpendence.

person. She spent much of her life doing the unconventional and unexpected.



After graduation from CD School of Pharmacy, she answered her Country's call and joined the Navy in World War II. She served at the Mare Island Naval Hospital in California where she became **not only** one of the first female pharmacists in the navy, but one of the first female Navy Chief Petty Officers ever. She told us fun stories about sneaking into the officer's club. She met the actor Tyrone Power at a local night club. He was so charming to her and her friends, she kept his picture on her refrigerator from 1943 until this January when she moved to assisted living.

After her honorable discharge from the Navy, she worked in several Denver hospitals as a pharmacist and eventually became the Chief Pharmacist at General Rose Memorial Hospital. Always doing things her way, she rose from childhood in a poor Colorado mining town, to a distinguished career in the Navy, to being one of Denver's prominent female executives. One of her proudest memories was being invited to join Zonta. Zonta is an international women's service organization that promotes the status of women throughout the world. Her years of service were honored by the Mayor of Denver who named the anniversary of her fifty years membership in Zonta as Marjorie Pickett Day.

Aunt Marjorie once told one of her employees at Rose Hospital, "There are two ways of doing things while you are working for me: my way and the wrong way." That employee became one of her dearest friends who valued Marjorie's opinions and guidance and thoroughly enjoyed watching her unfailing talent for getting what she wanted.


Aunt Marjorie loved her family and always supported her mother and father whom she loved dearly. She helped her sister Nona stay in her home until her death and loved her home in Louisville where her family settled in the 1920's. She loved the mountains. She would often arrange a family "Pickett-nic" and would produce a sign that read "don't step on the aunts" and we would head for the hills to find a soft rock near a quiet stream. She loved to water ski with her brother's family at Baseline Lake. She didn't fish, but would often take her father fishing on the Poudre River. She didn't like horses, but came to watch her niece and nephew ride. She traveled widely and enjoyed learning new things. She gave every family member a dollar to keep in our wallets whenever we traveled. She helped reunite her father with his long-lost brothers and attended Pickett family reunions in Tennessee. In her last years she enjoyed the role of family Elder and loved sharing our rich family history with all of us.

Aunt Marjorie and I (Donna) had a special bond and became best friends. I wanted her to be happy and smile. So whenever I could, I visited her and would sneak her out for dinner or ice cream or a ride in the mountains. I loved her dearly and will miss her.

Aunt Marjorie dedicated her life to her family and friends and she was a living history of this town. She will be missed by all.
