### **INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE**

Each year the International Day of Peace is observed around the world on September 21<sup>st</sup>. The United Nations General Assembly has declared this as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, both within and among all nations and peoples. The International Day of Peace was established in 1981 by the United Nations General Assembly and two decades later, in 2001, the General Assembly unanimously voted to designate the Day as a period of non-violence and cease-fire. The United Nations invites all nations and people to honor a cessation of hostilities during the Day, and to otherwise commemorate the Day through education and public awareness on issues related to peace.

On September 21<sup>st</sup> the United Nations Association invites you to join its members at the Posner Center (5:30pm-8pm) to celebrate this special day for a community conversation on gender equity, non-violence and organizing in Denver to achieve the UN Sustainable Development Goals. # Marley Weaver-Gabel JMK Scholarship Essay

Fun fact: I am great at grocery shopping. I have learned to read price tags like a second language, scouring discount racks like I am hunting for a lost wedding ring on the beach. I learned these discount-mongering, sales-searching, bulk-buying skills from my mother, the grand master of stingy spending. It runs in the family. Much of my childhood was spent in sympathetic stress over finances and it became my goal to live a financially comfortable life.

During high school, this goal guided me to an internship with a financial advisor. Through this, I learned about stocks and how to make money work for you through the market. *This is it*, I thought to myself. I am in close proximity to millions of dollars and if I can understand this complex system of monetary manipulation, I can be financially independent.

In the fall of 2015, I enrolled in a paracurricular course at Regis University titled Social Change. I had no idea how much it would actually end up changing me.

In class we visited the Posner Center to speak with a nonprofit that offers solar powered lamps to citizens in Namibia. Elephant Energy produces something so simple – a lamp – that radically improves quality of life. This moment changed my academic plans. Initially I declared as a business administration major with an emphasis in finance, but quickly switched to international business and actively began a life of service.

Through Regis, I have been sponsored to participate in service trips to Nicaragua and Haiti. I have encountered extreme systemic poverty that makes me acutely aware of my own privilege. My social position calls me to be more than a self-serving scrooge; it calls me to serve others. The empowering work I have witnessed, coupled with the impressive businesswomen at the helm of the operations, informs my post-graduation goals. Upon graduation, I want to serve two years in the PeaceCorps on a Community Economic Development project, working in the local economy to provide business opportunities to citizens. After, I envision myself working for a nonprofit to continue developing international economies.

My current pursuits are not centered on monetary fulfillment, but I still need financial support to succeed. The Zonta International Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship will serve as a cushion in my budget and allow me to remain enrolled at Regis University. If awarded, I will use the funds towards tuition. Given assistance with tuition, I can apply my personal savings to my upcoming semester abroad, which will further my understanding of international poverty and supplement my academic and vocational goals. I know that my purpose in life is to serve, with and for others, and I will be more successful businesswoman of service with a college degree. Financially, I cannot get there alone and this scholarship will serve me in achieving my highest goal in life.

#### SIX MONTH REPORTS AND BEYOND

The end of August and Labor Day bring on the same old things we say every year. Suffice it to say "I can't believe it......"

September 1<sup>st</sup> was the due date for the 6 month reports from our grant recipients from 2017. The reports have been heart-wrenching and inspiring. I am very proud of our work. Here in brief is how the last six months went: The Gathering Place was able to purchase commercial grade washers and dryers. These are ordinary appliances that we take for granted, but such a wonderful thing for homeless women and children. Dance To Be Free did some wonderful things with the grant. Female inmates of the Department of Corrections were able to receive dance lessons and instruction on teaching dance. Frustrations did abound, such as arbitrary rules and equipment that didn't function. If you have a battery that fails you can just jump in your car and run to Target for a new one. There are miles of red tape that go with everything that happens in a jail, requiring a lot of patience. The Homeless Women Vets had three motel rooms refurbished with all new linens, mattress pads and pillows. The pictures of the rooms were wonderful, giving six homeless women vets a decent, comfortable place to be secure and feel safe.

Our items for the month of September are feminine hygiene products, \$10 King Soopers Cards, or cash. These items will be going to The Gathering Place. The reason that King Soopers cards were chosen is that Kings is right on the bus line with The Gathering Place. Please bring these items to the September meeting. Lucky for us that our guest speaker will be from The Gathering Place so we can find out why these items are so valuable to their clients. Also, something that I assumed everyone understood, but just to make sure: you are under no obligation to bring "the item of the month" every time. All of us have a lot going on, whether it is time or money, so all of us need to do what we can, when we can.

Please remember our grant applications are due on September 19. Please encourage anyone who would fit our mission to apply for a grant. They must be a 501(c)(3). If you aren't clear on this, just ask, people know if they are a 501(c)(3).




