August Minutes

Women Have Economic Equality, right??

A few thoughts...

Waiting for governments to drive change for women's economic participation is as likely as a swift Brexit

Avon's CEO, Jan Zijerveld notes that current research demonstrates that still, after years of progress, much change is needed to bring women full to the economic opportunity table.

"The International Labour Organization (ILO) has estimated that 50 percent of women's productive potential is underutilized..."

Deep-rooted cultural biases and laws that protect them need to be changed.

"In 18 countries, men can legally prevent their wives from working. 49 countries lack laws protecting women from domestic violence. And women hold just 23.7% of parliamentary seats around the world."

Women: The Catalyst for Economic Growth? Women around the world still face obstacles to fully participating in the workforce, limiting a country's potential growth.

Lindsay Huth in a March 2018 article for US News & Devis Report reported that "greater gender equality can play a role in boosting economic growth." She cited Saudi Arabia's decision to lift its ban on women driving as having been partly driven by economic interests, according to Prince Khaled Bin Salman, Saudi ambassador to the U.S.

"By removing such restrictions, the country's leaders said they aimed to increase women's participation in the workforce from 22 percent to 30 percent in the next 12 years, a component of the Vision 2030 Plan government blueprint for economic growth. With oil prices down, the country is seeking to diversify its economy by turning, in part, to women."

The article continues:

"Greater gender equality can play a role in boosting economic growth, say analysts, prompting a number of countries to launch efforts to increase the number of women in their labor forces. In fact, higher labor force participation by women can offset a shrinking workforce, according to the International Monetary Fund."

"Today, in 2018, we have a strong body of evidence that shows that women's participation in the economy is critical because when women are able to fulfill their economic potential, GDP goes up and poverty goes down," says Rachel Vogelstein, senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington, in referring to gross domestic product."

Women May Be Key to Boosting U.S. Economy; Education, policy changes may hold answers to improving country's economic performance, analysts say.

Sintia Radu wrote, in a December 2017 article for US News & World Report, that a Standard & Poor's study shows the U.S. economy would be \$1.6 trillion larger today if American women entered and remained in the workforce at the same rate as women from Norway. Another way to conceive of the increase: \$1.6 trillion would translate to roughly \$5,000 more for every American.

And from just up the road in Sweetwater, Wyoming, this week, comes a guest column, <u>OPINION:</u> <u>Women's Issues are Economic Issues</u>, in which Miritt Comforti, a PacifiCorps purchasing manager says we are undermining our contributions and our impact by marginalizing issues of economic equality, childcare access, job opportunities and more as "women's issues."

"So-called "women's issues" are economic issues, and they directly affect our wallets. Previous and current investment in women has demonstrated direct benefits to taxpayers."

Edna Jean Hershey Trust & Metropolitan State



"One of the investment funds that we have is the Edna Jean Hershey Trust. This fund is available to a Zontian with a certified financial need, first in our club, next in Area 3, and last available to clubs in Colorado. In order to keep the 501 c 3 status of the fund, every three years the unused income is transferred to the Edna Jean Hershey Scholarship Fund at Metro State University. This fund is available to women at MSU who are single parents, have at least a 3.0 average and are at least a sophomore, and have a certified financial need. As of June 30, 2018, the scholarship fund has a balance of \$154,827. Total monies given by the Zonta Club of Denver to MSU Denver are \$192,187.

ADVOCACY

I must admit to feeling a little lost these past few months as I adjusted to my new home in Wisconsin after twenty years of building supportive relationships and friends in the Denver area. This summer I received an unexpected call from Pam Knackert, Membership Chair, of the Milwaukee Zonta Club inviting me to attend their meetings. This invitation was orchestrated by Kay Meyer of the Zonta Club of Boulder and long time leader in Zonta District 12 by informing her contact in the Milwaukee Club of my relocation. Kay wasn't asked to make this connection, but it's in her nature to proactively look out for her Zonta friends and I'm deeply grateful. This recent outreach gesture by Kay reminded me of how important it is for women to support and mentor other women. We are fortunate to be a part of an organization that recognizes the power of women when we work together. I'm pleased to report that I attended a meeting of the Zonta Club of Milwaukee in August where I was warmly welcomed. Many thanks to Kay.

Participation of Women in Government 2018

Dawn reported in July on the record number of women running for office in the United States this election year. This is encouraging

news, but when we compare the representation of women in government globally, we realize that we have a long way to go. The June 1, 2018 statistics compiled by the Inter-Parliamentary Union found on the United Nations Women's website revealed that the United States ranks number 102 in descending order out of 193 countries in the percentage of women in the lower or single house of parliaments or governing bodies. The total number of seats, number of women occupying those seats and percentages for the upper house or senate rankings are listed but not ranked in order.

For the lower or single house, Rwanda tops the list with 49 of the 80 seats of the lower house (61.3%) occupied by women. Although not in order of rank, it should be noted that Rwanda's upper house or senate has 26 seats with 10 occupied by women (38.5%). Cuba is second with 322 women (53.2%) occupying the 605 available seats in the single house. Bolivia, Grenada, Namibia, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Sweden, Mexico and South Africa complete the list of the "Top Ten" lower house percentages of the 193 countries in the report. The United States House of Representatives ranks #102 on the list of nations with 84 women occupying the 431 seats or 19.5%. The U.S. Senate has 22 women occupying the 100 available seats or 22%. As the 2018 election approaches, I hope we are all doing our homework in order to make informed decisions.

BY-LAWS

The Bylaws Committee met on August 7 and discussed several potential changes to our club bylaws and standing rules. Most important, the Committee voted to submit one change immediately to the club board and members for approval. That proposal appears after this article.

A few bylaws changes are "automatic," to conform to changes in the Zonta International bylaws approved at the Yokohama Convention. For example, there will be no references to "young professional" members. They are just members, but a member who has not yet reached her 30th birthday pays "under 30" dues. Also, in Article V, Section 1a, references to classifications described in the Zonta Club Manual and/or the Zonta International Marian de Forest Membership Manual will changed because classifications are no longer in those Manuals, but are on the ZI website under Membership Tools—Membership Planning.

Additional changes to the bylaws and standing rules are under consideration by the committee and will be submitted to club members for a vote later in the year.

Proposed Zonta Club of Denver Bylaws Amendment

The Bylaws Committee proposes the following change to the club bylaws:

Article VIII, Section 2:

SECTION 2. Qualifications. To be eligible for the office of President, or President-Elect or Vice President, a member must have been at some time a member of the Club Board for at least one year.

The rationale for this change is the difficulty of filling Board positions and the fact that a candidate for Vice President is no longer making a commitment to move up to President-Elect and then President, as was once the case.

The Board recommends that the members approve this change. The change will be put to a vote of the members at the September 13 club meeting.



Athena Project

Honor Killing is a suspenseful and compelling story of New York Times reporter Allisyn Davis who is investigating the honor killing of a young Pakistani woman at the hands of family. Allisyn is denied entrance to Pakistan, but armed with the most current technology, she conducts her investigation remotely from Dubai. Through a series of cultural collisions, candid interviews, and dangerous encounters she learns the horrifying details of the killing. Cultural bias, technology, and the limits of ethical reporting converge in this tale of two women trapped by their circumstances and culture.

Honor Killing was chosen from over 250 scripts submitted to Athena Project's development series, Plays In Progress. Our series accepts the scripts of women playwrights. Scripts chosen for development are presented as workshops, staged readings, or table readings. Honor Killing was presented as a table reading during our 2017 Athena Project Arts Festival, and then was refined and enhanced with support from our director, dramaturg, and audience feedback. Since 2017, the play has enjoyed a world premiere at the Florida Studio Theatre in Sarasota, Florida and we are delighted to bring a fully produced production to Denver audiences.

The show will run from September 8th through the 30th on Friday and Saturday nights at 8 PM with Sunday matinees at 2 PM.

Marian & Julie presented on the international convention in Yokohama. A lot of very interesting information was shared and these are just a few highlights:

- The breakdown of the club's international membership by region is roughly 17% Asian, 47% Europe, 19% USA, and 10% Australia.
- Zonta did pass a resolution for participation in Zonta International without being affiliated with a local club.
- Zonta Club of Denver was recognized as 4th in the country for our donations to Zonta International.
